It's designed for all ages and abilities as participants learn about the 15 or more species of nudibranch that make Haystack Rock their home. The class is free, but donations will be accepted.

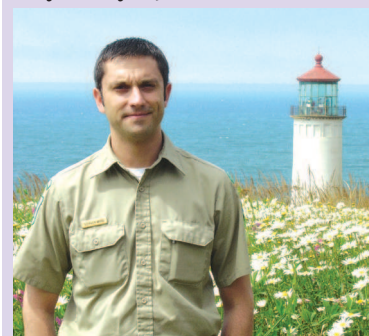

Angora Hiking Club to walk Cape Disappointment Trail

Angora Hiking Club will take on the Cape Disappointment Trail on Saturday, May 19.

The hike will be led by Stephen Wood, Washington State Parks interpretive specialist at Cape Disappointment.

The trail crosses through a Sitka spruce forest and will offer ample opportunity for plant and flower identification.

Scenic viewpoints include an overlook of Baker's Bay, the U.S. Coast Guard station and Dead Man's Cove. The trail to the lighthouse is rated difficult, about three-quarters of a mile one way with a steep uphill climb. Partic-

ipants should wear sturdy footwear or hiking boots.

Those wanting to carpool can meet at 9 a.m. at the River View Platform parking lot between Sixth and Seventh streets on Marine Drive in Astoria. Those not wanting to carpool can meet at 9:30 a.m. in the lower parking lot at the Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center in Ilwaco.
