## Warrenton Transportation System Plan Update

#### Open House No. 2 & Town Hall, October 10, 2018

Warrenton, Oregon – A public open house will be held on October 10 to discuss the Warrenton Transportation System Plan (TSP) Update. The public event will be held between **5:00 – 7:00 pm** at the **City of Warrenton Community Center, 170 SW 3<sup>rd</sup> St**. This meeting will have an open house format and participants are encouraged to arrive at any time during the event. This is an opportunity for community members to learn about the TSP update and give feedback about identified solutions to current and future transportation challenges and issues in Warrenton. The city's updated Transportation System Plan will help guide improvements for driving, walking, biking, transit and other transportation modes over the next 20 years.

So far the project team has:

- Developed a recommended package of solutions and strategies for addressing transportation deficiencies and needs for each travel mode, based on community feedback

- Identified potential funding options for the City to consider

- Made recommendations for updating City transportation standards and guidelines for mobility targets, roadway cross-sections, local street connectivity, and more.

Immediately following the open house on October 10 at 7 pm, is a town hall with Mayor Balensifer where attendees can ask any question about the TSP update or any other city project such as the Economic Vitality Road Map and future plans for downtown Warrenton.

The open house portion is designed for community members to review work to date and help the project team prioritize solutions and strategies in the TSP. The project team is particularly interested in getting community input on ways to address these issues and make travel in Warrenton safer, easier, and more welcoming and enjoyable. The open house will include more information about the overall process and schedule for the TSP update, as well as interactive stations for drawing, writing, and talking, with a focus on ideas and solutions that can help address current and potential future problems. Again, the format is open and community members can come any time during the event to participate.

On October 11, the Warrenton Planning Commission is scheduled to hold a work session that is open to the public and then public hearings in November to review the final plan.
