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Astoria businesses win awards

Three Astoria businesses won awards from Oregon Main Street's annual Excellence in Downtown Revitalization.

Mo's Chowder, Good to Go and Gimre's Shoes were recognized with dozens of other projects across the state. Awards were announced last month.

Mo's, a restaurant in downtown Astoria, won for Best Adaptive Reuse. The restaurant filled a large vacancy left when Englund Marine relocated out of downtown. The former warehouse now

houses a restaurant seating 160 people and a chowder production plant.

The \$3 million expansion created 30 full-time and 40 part-time jobs.

Good to Go won the award for Best New Business. Owners Heidi and Dan Dlubac rehabilitated a downtown bakery into a successful take-out and snack venue.

Gimre's, the oldest family-owned shoe store west of the Rockies, won Retailer of the Year. Gimre's was founded in 1892 by the grandfather of Pete Gimre, current owner.
