Scammers target businesses, pose as law officers

Telephone scams targeting businesses are making the rounds in Clatsop County, the Sheriff's Office reports.

"The scammers are impersonating law enforcement officers, including deputies from the Clatsop County Sheriff's Office," according to a press release. "The names they choose to identify themselves by may belong to an actual sheriff's office employee."

The scams attempted thus far target professional offices, but private citizens are expected to be hit up as it gets closer to tax return deadlines.

"This is a reminder to the public to be wary of unexpected calls from people identifying themselves as law enforcement," Sheriff Tom Bergin said. "While we do

make unexpected calls in the course of business, we do not ask for money over the phone, or require you to go to a store and make any purchase. We also do not inform others by phone of pending warrants for their arrest."

If you receive such a call, hang up and ignore the caller,

while sharing the name and number with others, according to Bergin.

If you're uncertain whether a caller actually is a law enforcement officer, call the appropriate agency and verify that they work there and have a valid reason for contacting you.
