Speaker provides lessons learned from Sri Lanka tsunami, 2007 storm

An emergency preparedness presentation by the founder of Tipping Point will be held twice this weekend.

The first presentation is at 6 p.m. Friday, Nov. 22, at the

Liberty Theatre, 1203 Commercial St., Astoria. The presentation will be repeated at 10 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 23, at Seaside Convention Center, 415 First Ave.

The event is sponsored by Clatsop County Emergency Management, in partnership with the cities of Astoria and Seaside.

Steve Eberlein's experience during the Sri Lanka tsunami in 2004 inspired a career focused on promoting preparedness in the Northwest, developing over a decade while working for the Red Cross in Oregon.

In 2016 he published "Prepare Out Loud," a community preparedness program aimed at building resilience after a 9.0-magnitude Cascadia Subduction Zone earthquake.

Eberlein's goal is to bring the region to the tipping point where earthquake preparedness becomes normal, expected and cultural.
