JULY

- •C&S Builders holds a grand opening at its new location on South Main Avenue at 10th Street in the former Warrenton Builders Supply store.
- •A series of raids on homeless camps finds needles, debris and many repeat offenders.
- •Don Bohn, an assistant county administrator for Washington County, is named Clatsop County Manager.

AUGUST

- •Warrenton High School's Mara Dowaliby is crowned Astoria Regatta queen.
- •Sheriff Tom Bergin, who has spent 35 years in law enforcement in Clatsop County, announces plans to retire at the end of the year.

SEPTEMBER

•Seven individuals and a sports team are inducted into Warrenton High School's Hall of Fame. They are Bob

- •Diane Collier, Warrenton's official historian, announces she'll retire from her unpaid position at the Oregon Welcome Center, leaving the kiosk in Youngs Bay Plaza without a tenant.
- •Warrenton Police Department swears in two new officers, Dylan McCoy and Madyson Hanna.
- •Pizza Hut closes restaurants in Warrenton's Youngs Bay Plaza and Seaside.
- •The city approves a contract with Big River Construction to build and landscape a park at the four-way stop.
- •Spruce Up Warrenton, a grassroots citizen group cleaning up downtown, wins the first-ever grant from the Reser Family Foundation.
- •The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers turns ownership of Hammond Marina over to the city, the culmination of decades of legal maneuvering and paperwork.
- •Skipanon Water Control District leaders announce the district will disband.

OCTOBER

- •The Confederated Lower Chinook Tribes, purchase 10 acres at Tansy Point for an interpretive park at the site of the 1851 Tansy Point Treaty.
- •The city signs a contract with Bergerson Construction to dredge Hammond Marina.

- •Warrenton is recognized for its efforts to revitalize downtown during a statewide conference of Oregon Main Street.
- •Three new restaurants are planned in Youngs Bay Plaza, including two in the former Dooger's Bar & Grill and a freestanding drive-through at the corner of Highway

101 and Harbor Drive.

•Warrenton Fire Chief Tim Demers resigns amid an investigation of safety violations by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

November

- •Warrenton residents pay less for homes, utilities and property taxes than residents of other areas, according to an analysis by the city's Public Works Department.
- •Warrenton Grade School science teacher Dionne Marshall is named Region One Outstanding Teacher of the Year by the Oregon Science Teachers Association.
- •Pacific Seafoods' workers dormitories are approved by the Planning Commission.
- •Veterans from Fort Stevens VFW Post 10580 receive specialized quilts from the nationwide Quilts of Valor Foundation.
- •The park at the four-way stop is officially named Warrenton Memorial Plaza.
- •Convicted child molester Larry Leach is sentenced to 42 years in prison for abusing three young girls.

DECEMBER

- •The Port of Astoria's finance director, Will Isom, is named executive director after serving as interim director for five months.
- •Brian Alsbury, a longtime volunteer firefighter, is named Warrenton's new fire chief.
- •Fire destroys a home at Warrenton Marina, displacing seven children and three adults.
