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told commissioners he'd like to build a senior care center and was unsure whether it was an allowed use.

There also was confusion over limitations on the amount of commercial versus residential acreage in the area, Yuill said. It previously had been zoned residential and the city approved a zone change last year allowing businesses along with the housing.

"For commercial mixeduse, we're a textbook place for (that)," Yuill said. "But we don't want it to become a gold rush with first-come, firstserved and everybody else los-



es out."

Commissioner Mark Baldwin proposed moving the hearing to Jan. 28.

"Any gray area, I want to clean it up and make it clear," Baldwin said. "We're never going to please everybody in the entire city with our decisions, but if we do our due diligence and do our best, that's all we can do."
