The meals are available to anyone 18 and younger, regardless of whether the child attends a district school.

Often the lunches consist of sandwiches, but at least a couple times a week there is something hot to eat such as hamburgers and corndogs. Breakfasts include individual cereals, yogurt, fruits and vegetables and milk.

Has it helped?

"It really has," said Brandon Runolfson, a ninth-grader at Warrenton High School. "During these pressing times, it's nice that they can wrangle out to help the community."

Times have been difficult for Jenny Partridge, who was waiting for the delivery

bus on Wednesday with her daughter, Ellie. Partridge works as a substitute teacher and is without an income until school is back in session.

"It's breakfast and lunch, which is nice and my food bill isn't as high," she said.

Michael Dietz has been sharing child-care respon-

sibilities with friends until their five kids can return to class.

"Definitely this has helped, considering mom still has to work," Dietz said. It's been helpful to dad and the babysitter."

In addition to food, children are receiving study plans and

other services, with more to come in the weeks ahead.

Just this week the Oregon Department of Education issued a large package of information to districts, including what will be required to have students graduate or move on to the next grade level. Local districts are personalizing those plans now.

Teachers are working remotely and getting individual education plans for students in place before April 13, Moha said.

A survey of student needs can be found on the district's website and Facebook pages and many parents have received it through the district's text-messaging system.

"This is a fluid situation, so we're going with the flow as the state gives us guidance,'

Moha said. "Any services beyond education that the kids receive are the issues we're trying to deal with right now."
