Entry: City's south entrance to get safety fix

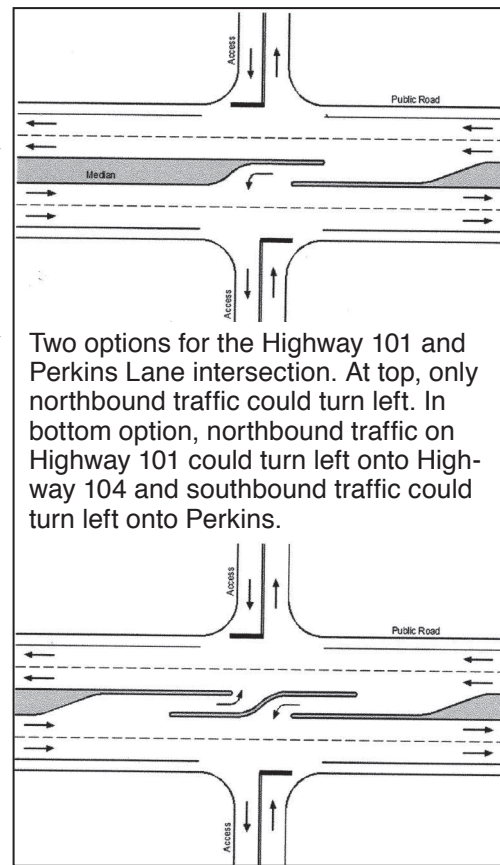
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A headache looming for Warrenton residents is how the completed project will impact the already overstressed intersection of Highway 101 with Ensign Lane near Walmart.

Those wanting to turn left onto the highway from either Perkins or Highway 104 will have to use a different intersection. There will be no more crossing several lanes of traffic.

So that means problems for Dolphin Road too, where a new middle school campus is under construction. Southbound traffic on 101 often accelerates at the intersection as it merges from two lanes down to one.

On Wednesday, the Clatsop County Commission reviewed the proposal with some trepidation. In that location, Fort Stevens Highway, also known as Highway 104, is in county territory, not Warrenton city limits.

County Public Works Director Ted McLean said he recommended ODOT reduce speed in the area to increase

safety.

"They're just pushing the problem down to another area," McLean said.

Warrenton Mayor Henry Balensifer saw some safety benefit in the improvements.

"Anytime when there's no traffic control and folks are crossing, essentially, four to five lanes there's little room for error," Mayor Henry Balensifer said. "I remember a couple years back that a school bus was hit in that intersection. It was a pretty bad ordeal."

The interchange project is expected to go to bid in October 2021, with construction to start the following spring. It wouldn't be finished until fall 2022, but most of the work will be done at night to mini-

mize disruption, Torres said.

ODOT plans a virtual open house this fall to let the public know about the work and answer questions.

Gov. Brown ignorant on masks

So if you want to wear a mask, by all means wear one. But do not shame others into partaking with false information or fear-mongering.
