Dentists now able to give flu shots

Health officials urge people to get flu shots this year especially because COVID-19 symptoms closely resemble those of the flu.

A bill backed by the Oregon Dental Association last year was approved by the state legislature allowing dentists to give flu shots.

ODE makes it formal: black lives matter

The Oregon State Board of Education passed a resolution in October declaring "Black Lives Matter."

The resolution supports justice and dignity for all people of color and renews the board's commitment to anti-racism, equity, and access to education as a core value, according to a press release.

The resolution also urges school districts, charter schools, and education service districts to take action to support black students, educators, and community members including renewing their commitment to anti-racism and strengthening networks of support for students and families who are experiencing increased harassment, violence, bullying, or hatred based on race. to increase readiness for rolling out an eventual COVID vaccine.

House Bill 2220 made Oregon the first state to allow dentists to offer any vaccination to their patients. Two other states allow dentists to give vaccines, but only against the flu and only for adults.

Oregon Health Sciences University School of Dentistry rolled out the program. Dentists in the Kaiser Permanente system have been through the training program and OHSU will provide additional hands-on vaccination training for more Oregon dentists this month.

Live science classes help in home-schooling

• Ocean Engineer, for grades 2 through 7, is from 1 to 3 p.m. Nov. 10.


• Habitat Explorer, for grades pre-K through 3, is from 1 to 3 p.m. Nov. 12.

Above: Middle schoolers build a remote-controlled device at Hatfield Marine Science Center. Right: Children look at sea life during a spring Home-School activity.


