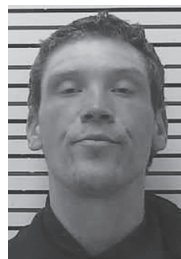

Robbery: Woman faces many charges

resisting arrest.

About 7:30 p.m. March 27, Walmart's asset-protection officers spotted a woman going through the store at a fast pace, tearing off tags and removing items from packaging. The items were either stuffed into a large beach bag she'd taken from a store shelf or worn on her person, including shoes, a face mask, glasses and T-shirts.

Once she picked up a pair of scissors to open more packaging, store security called police, fearing the scissors could be used as a weapon, according to a report.

Once officers arrived, they

waited for her outside the exits, according to a probable cause declaration.

The woman went to the store's garden center, pushed open an emergency exit and ran, dropping the beach bag.

Sgt. Jim Pierce chased her and let her know she was under arrest, according to the declaration. Once he caught up with her, she began hitting and kicking him in the face, neck and torso, according to declarations from two additional officers at the scene.

A review of all the items on her person and in the bag found she had attempted to take \$355 in merchandise and had damaged \$162 in goods with the scissors.

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Quake detection tool now available

ShakeAlert, an earthquake detection tool operated by the U.S. Geological Survey, has been enabled in Oregon. The Oregon Office of Emergency Management recently presented a free public webinar to explain what ShakeAlert is, how it works, why it's important, how to enable it, and what to do when an alert is received.

A video recording of the webinar is available on OEM's website and the OEM YouTube channel.

ShakeAlert uses science and technology to detect significant earthquakes and sends an alert to people via their cell phone before shaking arrives at their location.
