## OSHA fines contractor for safety violations

Oregon's Occupational Safety and Health Agency has fined a Seaside-based contractor more than \$15,000 for violating three job safety standards during a residential roofing project.

All three violations were repeat offenses, including one that exposed workers to potential falls that could seriously injure or kill them, according to the agency.

The citation against Syner-

gy Construction Group Inc. stems from an inspection launched in response to a complaint about a lack of fall protection for employees at a multi-story house in Seaside.

Falls are the leading cause of death in the construction industry.

The OSHA inspection found two employees working on the roof with no protection against potential

falls to the ground of up to 22 feet. It was a violation of a basic fall protection rule requiring employers to implement protective systems — such as a personal fall restraint system — when employees are exposed to a hazard of falling six feet or more.

It was Synergy's fourth violation in two years. Penalties multiply when employers commit repeat offenses.
