

Waterfront: Plan signals new day for port

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The waterfront plan includes an updated cruise ship terminal, a fishing village-themed boardwalk, new restaurants and a hotel. There will be better lighting, safe walkways, improved traffic circulation, and signs showing visitors what's where.

With the port's unanimous approval Tuesday, the plan will go before the Astoria City Council for approval on May 2.

Port Commissioner Dirk Rohne thanked the Astoria city leaders for their financial and leadership contributions in developing the plan.

"To say it was exceedingly collaborative would be an understatement," Rohne said. "I really feel like we've been working well together ... and we have a practical roadmap we can all support and move

forward in advancing our collective (interests)."

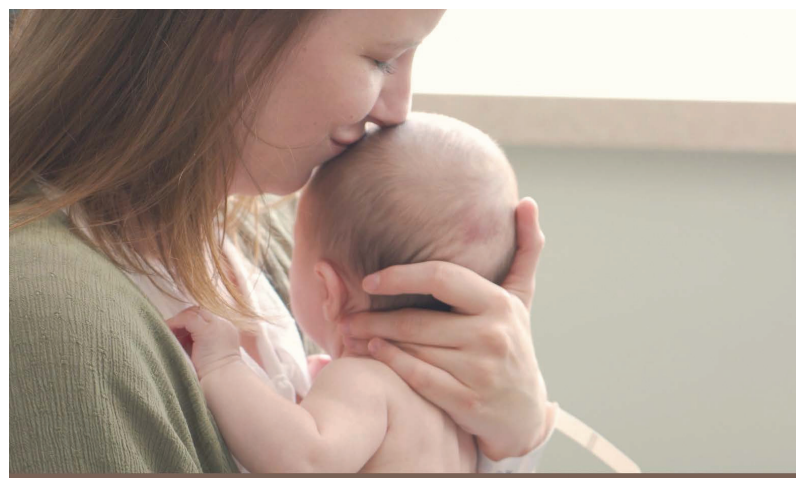
The revitalization of the formerly seedy waterfront is expected to attract private investment in the area, bringing jobs, and a better mix of uses. Residents, tourists, fishermen, diners, and business people should all feel comfortable there.

The multi-million dollar plan would start with easy fixes – the lights and signs –

followed by marketing for investors and developers who might want to build in the area.

"We are committed to implement this master plan," Spence said. "It will not sit on the shelf."

The port expects to host 21 cruise ships this travel season and more have sought reservations for 2023, according to the port's marketing director.

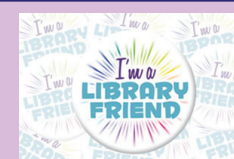
