All Circuit Judges to be Elected in June. Yesterday afternoon the supreme court rendered a decision which settles all controversies as to whether the circuit judges elected at the last election hold for two years or for the full term of six years. They retire from office July next. case was prepared in Lane county which involved the point in dispute. The county clerk, Joel Ware, refused to include in his formal notice a general election, that a circuit judge was to be voted for. W. S. Shaw, a resident of Lane county, applied to the state circuit court for a mandamus compelling the clerk to issue such notice. Judge Bean granted the mandamus and the case was appealed to the supreme court, who sustained Judge Bean. Two judges are to be elected in this district to succeed Judge Smith and Stearns.

Minister Winston, who went to his post as minister to Persia in all the gorgeous glitter of the uniform of a militia brigadier general, has not captured the Persian court's admiration, but has also won the hand and heart of the grand daughter of John C. Calhoun, despite the facts that he is handicapped with six children by a former wife, while the fiancée is a beautiful young thing of twenty four. Jones of Florida might try the effect of a general's uniform.

Hon. E. B. Washburne, ex-Minister to France, and often talked of as an available candidate for President, arrived in California on Saturday last, and until Monday was the guest in Sacramento of ex-Governor Newton Booth. Mrs. Washburne accompanies her husband, and are both now visiting a brother of the lady in Wheatland, Yuba county.

Grand Master Powderly of the Knights of Labor, now at Washington, is highly honored and respected by the Congressional Committee, as he has a "few" votes behind him. He is evidently a bigger man than Jay Gould, although he never sent a dispatch to Cleveland, congratulating him on his election as president.

The population of the Pacific northwest will increase about 50,000 this year judging from the rate people are pouring into Oregon and Washington territory at the present time. If each new comer brings \$300, the wealth of the country will be increased \$15,000,000.

Perhaps an explanation of the tardiness of the fighting transcontinental railroads about making peace is that they are all afraid they will suffer by a restoration of the old rates. If the war is continued a little longer they may conclude to disagree permanently.

Mrs. Hancock will receive the largest pension, \$2,000, paid to the widow of any soldier. Mr. Shields, widow of the General, receives \$1,200. Mrs. Grant receives a pension of \$5,000 per annum, but that is as the widow of an ex-President.

The Secretary of War has appointed two officers from the regular army to act as judges in connection with one officer from the English army—at the competitive drill of the Uniform Rank, Knights of Pythias, at Toronto, in July 1886.

The bondsman of John Q. Cannon, the Mormon sharper, were compelled to shell out \$25,000 for his non-appearance. The Cannon, loaded to the muzzle with piety, went off.

The registry list at Tacoma shows a voting population of 1710, of whom 520 are women. The municipal election will take place in May.

The New York Times is valued at \$1,000,000. George Jones owns 65 per cent. The remainder of the stock is held miscellaneously.

California begins to feel the force of low fares. Last week 6,000 people rolled into that State. MeJ. Gen. O. O. Howard has been ordered to the command of the Division of the Pacific.
