**EDITORIAL NOTES AND NEWS.**  
Paul Hamilton Hayne, the chief Southern poet, died at his home in Georgia recently.

W. W. Saunders, the Linn Co. murderer has been recaptured, arriving at Albany on the 27th.

About three thousand men are employed on the C. & O. R. R. north of Delta, and rapid progress is being made.

The Prohibitionists of Kansas held their state convention at Emporia on the 14th, and nominated a full state ticket.

The first bale of new grown hops sold at the produce exchange in New York city on the 22d, brought 50 cents a pound.

The California Fruit Union shipped east the first full train of fruit consisting of sixteen cars. The fruit is destined for Chicago as a distributive point.

Three hundred thousand dollars is being paid to the Cherokee nation for grazing privileges. This gives \$15.00 to each full blood. The negroes and other adopted citizens are not counted in.

Yreka has secured a change of the survey of the C. and O. R. R. so that she will be placed on the line of the road. A subsidy of \$75,000 was paid to the R. R. Co., which when all the bearings are taken into consideration is cheap enough.

At San Francisco on the 18th a seizure of eighty boxes, each containing five tael of the finest opium, was made by the searchers on board the Belgic. The salt pork barrels used by the crew were found to have false bottoms, and the drug was found in the space thus made at the bottom of the barrels.

A severe hail storm swept over a portion of Shelby county, Tenn., on the 20th, covering a scope of country five miles wide and about twenty long doing fearful damage. All kinds of crops were totally destroyed. Hay, corn and oats were not only leveled to, but were thoroughly beaten into the ground. The trees were entirely stripped of their fruit.

By an arrangement with the managers of the two political parties in this county, we were to carry the two political tickets in the Courier during the canvass for the sum of one dollar for each candidate thereon. So far, but one man has paid us. In this arrangement, besides carrying the tickets, it was understood we were to do as much lying for the respective candidates as our conscience would admit of and we did it. We complied with our part of the contract, and we know that every man who was elected on either ticket was elected on account of what we said in his behalf, and we believe that those defeated were left behind because we said too much for them. But that was what we were hired to do and we "went in" and won, and we would like to have all the candidates knowing themselves indebted to the Courier for these valuable services, come to the front and "skillet."

The propriety of having a celebration at this place upon the completion of the Rogue river and Applegate bridges, has been suggested to us and we wish to say that we are in favor of it. It will undoubtedly be the most important event of the day from the fact that it at once places a free road to the county seat for all the people across the river. They will give us a free highway and regular mails and each year save to our people many dollars which they can put away and keep as a good method of insurance, or they can invest it otherwise if they see fit so to do. Our proposition would be this: Let each farmer bring his basket well filled with such luxuries as he thinks he can afford and let the town people load their baskets also and meet on the bridge then and there to have one of those old fashioned picnics where the cares of life are temporarily removed, and where

genuine good heartedness and good will toward our fellow man may have full sway, its tide carrying upon its ebb a noble impulse to the hearth-stone of the good people of this most blessed and favored land.

**J. C. WESTON'S REQUEST.**

Some time ago we received a letter from J. C. Weston, cashier of the First National Bank of Clinton, Iowa, a gentleman who once occupied a handsome little cottage on the hill overlooking the then blooming and beautiful town of Waldo, in this county, requesting us to write up the several mining claims lying immediately around his old home. Mr. Weston was the owner of the water ditch now owned by J. Wimer & Sons, and he was engaged in extensive mining operations. enjoyed an enviable home, and he tells us, still retains pleasant recollections of the country and people near Waldo. He wants to know who of the old "timers" are still there.

The prominent gulches which were mined when he was last here, were Scott's gulch, Fry gulch, Butcher gulch, Shelly gulch, Sailor gulch, and Allen gulch. J. B. Desell and James Connell have a hydraulic claim in the first named gulch. They also use a Cranston elevator in connection. They have worked up the north side of the gulch about three hundred yards from where the gulch outlet was in early days, but they have an immense bed of gravel in the middle of the gulch and on the south side of it. This claim has been worked many years and promises to be worked as many more. Nelson Angel still has a pick and shovel claim just above that of Desell & Connell's. Aside from China rock-er claims these are the only claims now in Scott's gulch. Wm. Bybee, of Jackson county, has a hydraulic claim on the ridge between Scott's gulch, Allen and Fry gulches. Paul Laaterback and Nels Johnson have pick and shovel claims in Fry gulch. J. Wimer & Sons have a hydraulic claim in Butcher gulch wherein they use 1 1/2 large giants and three thousand feet of eleven and fourteen inch pipe. The opening of this claim was commenced in 1877 by Walter and George Simmons. Walter Simmons selling out to J. Wimer & Sons in 1878, and George Simmons selling out to them in 1883. This claim and the Scott's gulch claim run day and night most of the year, and they are really the most important mines in the camp already opened.

We omitted from the list of gulches the old Caro gulch which was purchased of the John Caro estate in 1883 by George Simmons, Frank Ennis and Theodore Cameron under the firm name of Ennis, Simmons & Co. This company are making an open cut from the river at the outlet of the gulch above the old Fisher ranch which extends up the drain of the Caro gulch about half a mile from the Illinois river, most of which is completed. The plan of opening being the same as that adopted in Butcher gulch, the cut being about seventy feet deep, and when completed to the old Caro mine, will be about three and a half miles long. The company has an immense ditch which they take from the river on the line of the old ditch but which has been enlarged. We believe they propose to tunnel the hill between the Caro gulch and Shelly gulch and finally work Shelly gulch through the same cut that they will work Caro gulch.

The opening of Butcher gulch was doubtless what led to this last undertaking and the opening of this mine and its successful operation will lead to other and more extensive investments. Sailor gulch is occupied by James Quinn, James Lyttle and Wm. Darkis, in a drift mine at its mouth upon which considerable money and time have been expended. Allen gulch is occupied by J. Wimer & Sons, and Wm. Darkis which has been under a lease to the Chinese, the claim of W. Bybee also dumping a portion of their debris through it. Outside of China claims where short sluices and rockers are used, we believe there are no other claims in the old Sailor diggings camp.

The irrigating ditches around the town are out of use so that green lawns and grassy yards once so common, are very hard to retain after the dry season sets in. The residence of Mr. Weston was burned about four years ago. The pioneers yet remaining in the vicinity of Waldo, are Chas. Hughes, George Simmons, Chas. Decker, J. B. Desell, James Connell, John Boles,

Nels Johnson, Frank Bryhan, J. W. Bennett, Jas. Quinn, Jas. Lyttle, Wm. Darkis, R. Adams, Wm. Neil, M. McBrearty, T. F. Floyd, Dan Hunt, and Nelson Angel. Logan Thompson, Coyle and we believe, Crandall, are all dead. A. B. McIlwain is in Albany, and Hon. H. K. Heimah, is in Jacksonville, this State.

**KENT, COLVIG CONTROVERSY.**

We regret to say that this case is still unsettled, and we are informed Mr. Kent is still contending for the office, basing his claim thereupon on a very questionable technicality in the manner of Mr. Colvig's qualification.

We are in receipt of a letter from Jackson county written by a gentleman high in office from, which we make the following extract: "I am glad to see you take the course you have in the Kent-Colvig controversy and you can rest assured that your views meet the approbation of all who are acquainted with the ex-district attorney."

Mr. Kent has by his conduct in this case placed himself in a very disgusting attitude before the people, who have several times honored him by their votes and we think we can show by the following section of the law that his position is as untenable as it is disgusting: Section 37 of the code, page 573, says: "And it shall be the duty of the Secretary of State, in the presence of the Governor, to proceed within thirty days after election, and sooner if the returns be all received, to canvass the votes given for Secretary and Treasurer of State, State Printer, Justices of the Supreme Court, member of Congress, and District Attorney," &c., &c.

The last election was held on the 7th day of June. The secretary had according to this law thirty days from June 7th in which to complete the canvass of the votes which this year would have taken the date allowed the secretary of state in which to make his canvass to the 7th day of July, and he had a right to prolong the canvass of the votes to the 7th day of July before completing his canvass, and even then the law further says on page 574, Sec. 38:

"If the returns of the election of any county in this State shall not be received at the office of Secretary of State within thirty days after the election, the Secretary shall forthwith send a messenger to the county," &c.

Mr. Kent claims that because Mr. Colvig did not qualify on the 5th day of July, that he was ineligible to the office of district attorney. The law does not say so, nor does it convey that impression. If the secretary of state may for any cause take until the 7th day of July in which to canvass the votes, can Mr. Kent claim that Mr. Colvig must qualify on the 5th day of July?

**SHALL WE CELEBRATE.**

Elsewhere in this issue will be found our proposition for a celebration upon the completion of the Rogue river and Applegate bridges. That we may be understood as wishing to do full justice to all, we say that the gentlemen who should have the most credit for working through the Oregon legislature the appropriation for the Rogue river bridge are as follows: Hon. A. A. Porter, Hon. Henry L. Davenport, Hon. Henry Rodgers and Hon. Jonathan Bourne, all members of the lower house. Hon. P. P. Prim, Hon. H. B. Miller and Hon. J. C. Carson, members of the Senate. These gentlemen deserve long and lasting praise for their untiring energies in our behalf and for this special boon to life, liberty and the privileges of the people. Long may they live, and prosperity attend them. But let's have the celebration at a point to be agreed upon. The bridges will be completed about the 15th or 20th of August.
