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Hon. Binger Hermann.

Oregon holds her election for Representative in May. At that time she decided to return her present Representative Hon. Binger Hermann. Mr. Hermann is a native of Lonaconing, Maryland, and was born February 19, 1843. His education was obtained at the common schools and at Independent Academy, near Baltimore. He removed to Oregon, taught school, studied law, and entered upon the practice of his profession in 1866. He has held the office of State Representative, State Senator, Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue, and Receiver of Public Moneys at the Land Office. He is largely interested in the shipping and lumbering business. His residence is Roseburg. He was elected to the Forty-ninth Congress as a Republican.—[The Cincinnati Graphic News.

"Yesterday was a day long to be remembered by the family and friends of Aunt Solome Jacobs of Lancaster township, the occasion being the return from Oregon and California of her two sons, A. S. and I. N. Jacobs, the former having been absent twenty-one and the latter twenty-seven years. About 10 a. m., the friends began to arrive and by 1 p. m., about 235 persons had gathered at the old homestead.—After usual greetings in the way of an old-fashioned hand shaking, a table about sixty feet long was improvised in the grove, upon which was spread a bountiful repast, such as the good ladies know how to prepare when they are arranging for a picnic. The dinner was elegant, and an abundance for all. After dinner the table was transformed into a circle of seats, and Elder Anson Richardson being called upon, gave us a regular old-time sermon, such as we had not heard for many years. After the sermon we were favored with some very fine music, both vocal and instrumental, by the young folks, who displayed more musical talent than we expected to hear; in fact it was splendid. The crowd dispersed about 5 p. m., all agreeing that it was good to be there."

In a few days the Northern Pacific Terminal company will advertise for proposals to build the big machine shops at Albina. The foundation was laid some time since and the material and machinery have been on the ground more than a year, waiting for the order to go ahead. This order has come at last and will be executed without delay. It will cost something like \$1,500,000 to erect the shops, most of which will be for labor, and will make times very lively this fall and winter around Albina.
