When the mob marched on the jail it was repulsed by the police force which charged, the mob fleeing. During the terrible excitement attending the mob a large number of men, women and children were trampled upon and others injured by the surging mass of over-wrought humanity. During the excitement the prisoner was scared almost to death.

Traveling Notes.

A trip to Woodville is indeed a very pleasant drive of less than two hours, the distance being nine miles but the road is excellent. Starting out we go up Sixth street to the intersection of A street, turn to the right on A and follow it to the intersection of the county road, thence past the residences of John Hood, Thos. A. Hood, S. E. Isham, G. C. Farr and J. P. Tuffs. These residences stand along the road in close proximity to each other, all being within the first mile from the end of A street. They are built on beautiful little eminences presenting every proof that this is to be one of our most beautiful drives, and these little homes, the surrounding scenery, the valuable fruit and vegetable lands and the large valley below and in front constitute one of nature's beautiful panoramas which need but the touch of skill and taste to complete the picture. After passing Mr. Tuffs place, we pass two or three places before we come to Mr. Savage's, which is on the opposite side of the Rogue river and is dotted all over with buildings—almost a town. Mr. Savage is one of our industrious and prosperous farm and stockmen and an old resident of Southern Oregon. Woodville is located in the valley of Evans creek, and is composed of two stores and two hotels. C. W. Clark is postmaster, merchant and the landlord of one of the hotels. Henry Mensor keeps the other store, while our old friend W. J. Stanley keeps the other hotel and also a feed stable in connection. Mr. Stanley is the son-in-law of Col. John E. Ross, and his estimable wife knows to a certainty just how to get up a first class meal; so nice and clean and tasted so good that we imagine we eat more than we paid for. This valley is about a mile wide at Woodville, in which may be seen several farms and their cozy houses and barns immediately around Woodville. The valley extends easterly up Evans creek about 15 miles, and is settled all the way. Peasant creek empties into Evans creek seven miles above Woodville, it's source lying more to the west, and is also settled for a distance of about seven miles from its mouth. There are also gold mines of this place and quartz on both of these creeks, the quartz extending all over the adjacent mountains, and Mr. Stanley informs us some of the ledges are rich and that there are indications that a San Francisco company will begin operations ere long in that vicinity. There are also salt works and mineral springs well up on the main creek. There are two large school districts on the creek but no mail service, people traveling fifteen miles to get their mails. This is contrary to the manner of custom now-days, and is an injustice to these people and a wrong, especially toward their children who are as much entitled to the benefits arising from mail facilities as any of Gods people. In time there will be more good mines discovered in that section. We saw a fine quality of gold in Mr. Simon Simpkins' claim, also from the claim of Mr. Wilcox. We regret that our space cuts this article short.

Is Iron to be Superseded.

The question has hitherto been how to separate it from the compounds, but no American will doubt that, being in the earth's crust, it can and will be got out when it shall be demanded. Aluminum is light as chalk, malleable as gold, tenacious as iron and harder than steel. It is soft when ductile, fibrous when tenacity, and crystallizes when hardness, are required. It neither rusts nor tarnishes, is tasteless and odorless, makes numerous and satisfactory alloys, has bulk without weight, strength without size, and conductivity far exceeding that of iron. Its use will open limitless prospects in all directions, all departments of building, furnishing and utensils, plumbing, bridges, railways, steamships and telegraphs would be revolutionized, and transportation gain incalculably in speed, safety and economy. Already the price has been brought within the reach of the manufacturing arts, and the process of increasing the production and decreasing the cost is constantly going on.—[Kansas Illustrated West.
