Another public meeting was held at the court house Wednesday night to discuss the propriety of changing the name of the town. The vote stood 72 against to 14 in favor of changing; that ought to settle the question.

J. M. Payne and Simeon Messenger, county commissioners, came to town Tuesday to hold county court. They are giving good satisfaction in looking after the interests of the county, and are getting the endorsement of the people for the same.

A. P. Bishop of Wilderville recently informs us that he and others have discovered a quartz ledge on Dardenelles mountain, which assays \$22 per ton. Two quartz ledges and one placer claim have been located by them, in the name of the "Ohio Mining Co." Mr. Bishop says they are well pleased with their claims and thinks they will succeed well in working them.

We are in receipt of a sample box of dried apples, sent by Mrs. L. Chappell of Applegate. They were dried by the patent machine called the "Common Sense Steam Evaporator," for which the lady is now acting as agent. The fruit, instead of being dry and tasteless like dried apples generally are, is as juicy and palatable as the green fruit itself. We thank the lady for the fruit, which is the finest in quality we have ever seen. The machines are made of common tin and sheet-iron according to size wanted, and can be used on common cook stoves.

The posting of so many display bills by the advance agent of Johns sons colored combination, led to the death of the most enterprising black hog in town. The hog evidently took a look at the colored contentions standing on their heads, etc., and concluded that no expert stop lifter could do likewise. So she went behind the Blackwood hotel, climbed the wall of the house, got on a box, pointed her nose at the "bulldog" of a soap barrel which stood below, and dove for the cabbage stalk supposed to be on the bottom. The result was, the barrel hit the hog to death. The market on pickled-pork next morning stood on end, sales being light.

The several trains arriving and departing new years eve and new years morning "raised Ned" with their whistles. Jim Wheeler, engineer for the Ashland train commenced it away down in Tufts field then Hall sailed in with No. 1 and whistled as long as he could keep his engine in town. Wheeler never did quit. Then at 10'clock Evans came up with the Portland train and with a "blocked" engine whistled both the other engines into hysterics. The next day the two freight engines in charge of Casey and White got down on their metal and whistled so long, loud and shrill that work was on-suspended. People thought the town was on fire.

W. Snarr, Harry Tremain, L. Killesey and High Donegan were arrested by Sheriff Patterson on Wednesday morning on a warrant sworn out in Justice Goodells court by Newt Vocom in which they were charged with the crime of riot. During December 2,650 passengers have arrived in this city, via the Northern Pacific and Oregon Short Line Railroads, and by steamer from San Francisco, as compared with 2,797 for November, 3,244 for October, 2,087 for September, 4,512 for August, 3,100 for July, 3,183 for June, 4,709 for May, 4,743 for April, 4,884 for March, 4,873 for February, and 1,797 for January, a total of 40,692 for the year. Correspondence.

There is perhaps no brighter future for Josephine county in her varied resources, than that of gold mining. That part of the county near Kerby has always been regarded as an especially rich one, from the fact that, even while there were few or no hydraulic claims a few years ago, the small, primitive mines are known to have produced not less than \$500,000 per year; and it is probable that even double this amount was mined, though the fact that so much was sent out of the country of which no account was given, makes it difficult to give an exact estimate. And now, with the powerful machinery and thorough enterprise of the miners, it is more than probable that, before many years have passed, this country will be ranked among the greatest gold fields of the West. Our notice was more forcibly drawn to this fact from the developments which have just been completed on the Illinois, by the Kerby Milling & Mining Co., of which we have before made mention. The company commenced on last July to construct a ditch five miles long and five feet wide, from Hendersons creek to the Illinois river, covering one of the finest known mining sites in this section. This they have just completed in the most thorough manner, making one of the most substantial improvements in this part of Josephine county. There is 120 feet fall from the "penstock" to the flume, with a 15 inch pipe connecting a Hotchkiss kind carrying a 4 inch nozzle. Year correspondents passed a couple of days at the company's mine recently, and was surprised at the substantial character of the improvements and the careful knowledge displayed in their arrangement. The company's claim is extensive, and the character of gravel and appliances for working it, admirable. The "cut flume" and "mump" are the finest in the state, and Manager Coker, an expert and practical miner, looks sharply after the interests of the company.

This, however, is only part of the improvements in view, as they have surveyed an additional ditch of some fourteen miles, taking the waters from Sucker creek. This ditch will be ten feet wide, and carry a supply of water sufficient to run some ten engines for nine months in the year, making one of the largest hydraulic mines in operation. BRONCO.

During the past year, Ashland has built eight brick stores, 32 residences, also, Granite Hall, Granite Hall Association, \$3,500; Store improvement, H S Emery, 500; Hotel improvement, Diner & Bridge, 300; Hotel imp. O Ganiard, 300; New warehouse, Youle & Gilroy, 350; Barn and woodshed, A S Jacobs, 450; Store front, J M McCall, 250; Ashland City Roller Mills improvement, F Roper, 4,000; Ashland Woolen Mills imp., 3,000; Planing and sash and door factory imp., Youle & Gilroy, 500; Star Bakery imp., G S Butler, 100; Photo Gallery imp., Logan, 200; Dwelling, C B Stone, 100; Mrs A V Gillette, 100.

This list includes eighteen new buildings—two large brick blocks, twelve dwellings, one large public hall, one warehouse and one barn. Among the remaining items of dwellings improved are a number of instances of remodeling and enlarging which make practically new buildings of the houses.

Central Point has built as follows: Next to Ashland, Central Point has expended more money for building improvements during the past year than any other town in the valley.
