We acknowledge receipt of wedding cards announcing the marriage of N. A. Jacobs and Miss Emma Strang, at Medford, on Feb. 16. We have known Newt. ever since he was a little boy and are pleased to say that as a man of character and as a competent accountant and official he has few superiors. We have been associated with him in business and pleasantly remember that in matters requiring punctuality and responsibility Newton A. Jacobs needs no watching. Our everlasting good will goes with them.

A correspondent writing to us from Jacksonville calls attention to the announcement in a former issue of the COURIER of this notice, "Born to the wife of N. McNair, a pair of twins" and says, "now I have a record on this score—my record is simply twins. What I want to know is, has McN. four of 'em?" Well, that's the way our informant gave us the item. Ministers and justices of the peace in performing the marriage ceremony nearly always say in solemn tones, "I pronounce you man and wife." Editors are prone to say a "pair of twins," which compares very favorably with this manner of marriage. The ceremony should either state that the "high contracting parties" are either man and woman or that they are "husband and wife." Whenever this is corrected we will correct the "twins" business, and not before. We hope however, to be able to retain the parties objecting as subscribers to the COURIER.

We are in receipt of letters and cards from Hon. W. D. Fenton of old Yamhill, announcing that he is now vice-president and one of the directors of the First National Bank of McMinnville. He is therefore a National banker. We remember Billy as a farmer boy; then as a student at Monmouth college where he graduated, and where he met, wooed and won the fair daughter of farmer Lucas. We remember the first

time we met him after he had completed his studies at Monmouth, he was driving a header wagon, and was as black and dirty as smut and dust could make him. Afterward he became one of our foremost orators, prominent at the bar, ran for congress against Hon. M. C. George winning many laurels in a fight against a large republican majority in the state. He next appeared as one of the agitators of the narrow gauge railroad from Dallas to Portland, which is now nearly completed. Now we hear of him as a National Banker, and we know he will do honor to his new calling.

Less than four years ago there were enrolled in the Grants Pass school district, about twelve pupils; no town existed here; cheap teachers were employed when there was money in the treasury to pay them; the school did not increase in attendance nor did the interest in the cause of education expand. There was nothing to cause an increased interest in attempt to build up the school. But things have changed. On last Wednesday, in company with Mr. J. C. Boyd, we visited the school. We find that it consists of four large rooms and four departments to-wit: Primary department presided over by Mrs. H. L. Benson, where are the chart classes, first and second reader classes, and where object lessons, oral arithmetic and geography are also taught.

Mrs. S. U. Mitchell instructs those attending the preparatory department, in second and third reader classes, geography, arithmetic and grammar.

Miss Winifred Mosher, of Roseburg, has charge of the intermediate department. She teaches classes in the fourth and fifth readers, also in grammar, history, geography, arithmetic and popular science.

Prof. H. L. Benson, the principal of the academy, has charge of the high school department, in which the following branches are taught: Reading, arithmetic, algebra, geometry, Latin, natural philosophy, grammar, history, physiology, word analysis, vocal music, book-keeping and the science of government.

In all these departments the work is systematic and thorough, reflecting much credit upon the teachers.

Two hundred and seventy pupils are enrolled, ranging in age from four to thirty years; two hundred of whom belong to the district, the remainder having been induced to patronize the school because it bore a good name. The pupils are bright, intelligent and happy, well behaved and industrious, of whom their teachers are justly proud. To sum the matter up within our brief space we conclude that every dollar paid toward the maintenance of this school has been a legitimate investment, and while it has cost a considerable sum to build and otherwise keep up with the demands of the district, the money has been well spent. We hope to see it sustained and its capacity and usefulness increased, believing that the educational interests of the county demand it. Our schools, our churches, our bridge and every other useful and beneficial monument of our progress, must be sustained. Let the minister and orator who talks to our people, see that their intelligence has been well nurtured.

ED. COURIER.—Your manly and outspoken words against the wanton and useless destruction of deer, contained in your issue of last week, will be heartily endorsed by all lovers of law and order. What a farce on the intelligence of the community to send men to our legislative bodies, paying them large salaries at the public expense, for the purpose of framing laws for the protection of all the interests pertaining to the welfare of the people, and then to have them set at defiance in the reckless and dare-devil manner in the way some are doing. There is scarcely a day passes but that the hounds are heard within two or three miles of town chasing deer, and the rapid firing of repeating rifles, after which the baying of the dogs ceases until another poor unfortunate is startled from its hiding place, to be slaughtered in a similar manner. Such wholesale destruction of deer is wrong, and should be discontinued by all true sportsmen; but to go out in open defiance of law and shoot them down simply for their pelts, is an outrage that should not be tolerated.

A similar course has totally annihilated the buffalo from the plains east of the Rocky mountains; and if allowed to continue here, it is only a question of time until the deer will be destroyed. If men are hungry, let them go to true hunter style, relying upon their trusty rifle and steady aim to bring down their game. No one would object to that; in fact, the writer of this article, in case of necessity where a man needed meat to feed a hungry family, being unable to purchase it for them, would unhesitatingly assist him in procuring it.

But the course you are now pursuing, with the advantage of your improved repeating rifles, assisted by a pack of hounds, don't you see that within a few years you will have killed off all the deer, and then your sporting will be gone. The deer are poor and thin at this season of the year, consequently are not fit for table uses; therefore, we say, don't—give the poor things a rest, and learn to become law-abiding citizens. Such willful violation of law may lead you into trouble. Better stop before you are caught. A certain physician living in one of the prairie states, well known to the writer, persisted in shooting prairie chickens, contrary to law. His friends warned him, but he defied them to interfere. The result was he was arrested and fined fifty dollars and costs, for shooting one chicken. Let us be manly in this matter, and take our chances with those who wait until it is lawful to take the game.

Flow Flow.

From the Ashland Tidings: The blasting of the railroad forces at or near Klamath river was distinctly heard in Ashland last Monday.

Over on Antelope the hay is all gone, and stockmen are cutting down trees and shrubs for their cattle and sheep to feed upon. There has been but little loss of stock, however, as yet.

A cow at Maj. Barron's place south of Ashland gave birth to a double-headed calf one night this week. When found the calf was dead. It appeared perfectly formed in every respect except for the addition of one more head than was necessary.

Last Saturday Mr. A. J. Allen, who has been in the employ of the Southern Pacific railroad company for a long time, came over to Ashland to buy sixty head of team horses to be used by the company in hauling materials and supplies from the railroad terminus northward along the line of construction.

Mr. Allen secured the assistance of Geo. W. Stephenson of the Ashland Livery Stables' and on Monday Mr. S. advertised by handbills for horses weighing 1100 lbs. and more to be brought into town on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. By Wednesday evening he had brought three head here, at an average price of about \$100 per head. Yesterday morning Messrs. Allen and Stephenson went to Jacksonville to meet there till Saturday evening per-

The railroad surveyors of the Central Pacific have reached Barrons on this side of the Siskiyou mountains. They will survey five miles from that point which will bring them near Ashland. The grade from the tunnel down the mountain is 170 feet to the mile. It is reported that they will use this tunnel for the present, but will at some time in the near future run another tunnel lower down and connect with the road they will build at this time. Mr. George Stephenson, who is here buying horses for the company, says that the work is going right along without any interruption, the same as it has been through California. This would indicate that they either had the road or had sufficient assurance that they would get the road, to warrant them in pushing the work along as rapidly as possible.
