WILDERVILLE, Or., March 7th.
 ED. COURIER:—As we have seen considerable in your paper about the Grants Pass School, of which the people of Josephine county have just cause to be proud, and but little about the Eureka High School, if you will grant us a short space in your columns, we will give you many readers a brief review of our school.

It opened on October 4th with eleven students, but soon increased to about forty, eighteen of whom reside outside of this district. There are seven in attendance, who intend to teach this Spring, some of whom now hold first grade certificates.

Class "A" has gone through the written arithmetic, mental arithmetic, comprehensive geography, grammar, U. S. history and physiology. This month they are reviewing the same.

We have very interesting classes in physical geography, algebra and book-keeping. All boarders, when well, are required to study two hours every night.

The literary society meets every Wednesday night. The exercise consists of debates, reading a paper, orations, declamations, dialogues, essays, select reading and singing. Prof. Whitelaw has an interesting class in both instrumental and vocal music. He is preparing for a singing concert at the close of the school.

The present term will close the 25th of this month. STUDENT.

Correspondence.

KERRYVILLE, Or., Feb. 19, '87.

ED. COURIER:—After four weeks solitary confinement in my cabin on the creek, not being able to stand the pressure longer, I yesterday made a break for the valley. Leaving home about ten o'clock a. m., of Friday, I arrived at Dr. Spence's about night-fall, and he with his lady made me hang up for the night; but you need not believe that it took much pressing to cause me to stay, though I made the usual excuses provided for all such "old bachelors" as myself. They very naturally surmised that I conferred a favor upon them rather than that I received one from them. After dreaming of cats, coyotes and numberless other things, I started for the ex-county seat relieved in mind and body, for the roads were frozen and the snow grew beautifully less with every step that I made forward toward your great and growing village—do not expect me to fall into your very exalted views and call it a city.

Well, I plodded along on my journey until I had passed the city of the dead covered with its winding sheet of virgin snow. Here I met a traveler, who told me I had better turn in, as they were about to have a funeral there. Upon inquiring who had clasped the icy hand of death, I was informed that a man who was a stranger and who had not been on this side of the Rockies more than two years, had been found frozen in the snow over above Josephine creek.

Josephine creek is a tributary of the Illinois river. It rises or has its head in what is known as the Rough and Ready gulch, rough enough surely, in the finest weather, but at this time of the year it is as lonesome and dreary as any range of mountains over which I have ever been. The creek of Josephine has cut its way through the serpentine and blue slate formations which compose the general foundation of this part of the coast line, through high bluffs and deep gulches in a north-easterly direction, almost to its junction with the Illinois river. The whole country around is still a wilderness and one highly distasteful to the general traveler, broken up as it is with boulders, precipices and tangled brush, even in the summer months when all is bright with sunshine. But in winter, when the snow lies thick and deep, it is a dreary desolation indeed.

On the 16th of Feb., '87, two young men might have been seen leaving their rude log cabins, with their guns upon their shoulders, lively of spirit and full of life, hopeful of a joyous return, with a good supply of venison. Up among the hills and crags, over the dazzling snow they went with nimble feet and watchful eye. Like all hunters who go in couples, they separated. Intent only on the chase of the deer, time and distance are forgotten until the setting of the wintry sun reminds them that it is time to return for refreshment and sleep. The cutting night wind makes its way along the mountain side, the stars come twinkling one by one and shed their faint light upon the steep and treacherous way. In my mind I see a dark form tramping, falling, rolling on towards a deep and rocky canyon, tired and bewildered, yet determined to press on and snatch a victory from death.

Who but those who have been in the same position can attempt to describe the agony of those midnight wanderings among the ice and snow of an Oregon Winter in the mountains. Slowly on, falling and struggling, the bloodshot eye and faltering step show that hope is almost dead within that youthful breast. The numbing cold and cross feeling, the thoughts of a soft warm bed, and the very snow flakes spread out around courting him to take a pleasant sleep. God knows it will be a sleep that knows no awakening in this world. He stumbles and disappears within a canyon dark as doom; yet the night winds utter no cry—all, all is silence.

Down below, partly lying in a rocky gulch with his tired head upon a bunch of heath, I gaze upon a youthful form. Oh, how wild and desolate the surroundings; yet how pleasant the dreams and soft the rest of the sleeper, with a smile on his face and a tear-drop frozen on the lashes of either eye. Oh painless death! Oh beautiful snow! Thou hast spread thy shroud around him. No more pain, no more strife. Thy spirit hath fled to the God who gave it. Thy brothers may seek but will only find the frozen face of the one whom they so dearly loved in life's bright day. And here in this rocky canyon, at early dawn of Feb. 17th, his elder brother found the body of Fred Jones. The miners who first heard the sad tale, went to where he lay and carried his unconscious body to a cabin; but the light of life had gone out, and they laid him away in his narrow bed.

As I gazed upon the calm, still face within the coffin, ere the lid was closed forever, and marked the calm, sweet smile which rested there, I asked my own heart, why doth ye so long for that which, at best, is but a breath and withal so full of strife and care. But God is good.
