

IN MEMORIAM.

DR. DAVID B. RICE.

The Ashland Tidings pays the following tribute to the memory of Dr. D. B. Rice, who died recently in that city:

Dr. Rice was born July 10, 1817, at Greenville, Kentucky, and was the grandson of Rev. David Rice, the first Presbyterian minister located west of the Alleghany mountains. who moved into Kentucky in 1783, and organized the first Presbyterian church within the boundaries of the present state. Dr. Rice moved to Illinois in 1833; read medicine and graduated at St. Louis, Mo., from the McDowell College in 1844. At the outbreak of the war he entered the army as surgeon of the 102d Reg. Ill. Volunteers—also brigade surgeon. Had charge of Hospital No. 8 at Gallatin, Tenn. After the second day's battle of Stone river there were 3300 soldiers in the hospital at one time. Here his services were so well appreciated that he was presented with a fine gold watch, which he carried and treasured till the day of his death. The watch was purchased with money raised by small contributions from the men—no sum over \$1 being permitted from any one. Being broken down by hard service Dr. Rice was compelled to resign, and returned home to Monmouth, Ill., where he acted as general medical examiner for the government in that district. At the close of the war he came with his family to Oregon and settled in Albany. He organized the Linn Co. Medical Society, the first medical association formed in Oregon, and was also one of the originators of the State Medical Society of Oregon, of which he was elected president once or twice. He took a prominent part in the organization of the Oregon Medical College, and was one of its first professors. About three years ago he came with his family to Ashland and practiced his profession here till the time of his last illness.

He was twice married, first in Jan., 1844, to Miss Isabella H. Phelps, daughter of Hon. S. S. Phelps, of Okanagan, Ill. She died after but three months of married life from a fever contracted from her husband, who was dangerously ill at the time. In 1846, he was happily united with Miss Mary M. Norcross, of Monmouth, Ill., who survives him, after over 40 years of happily spent married life. Seven children were born to them, only three of whom are living, the eldest, Will B. Rice, general agent of the O. P. R. R., Miss Lillie, and D. Lyle, O. & C. R. R. operator at Grants Pass.

Dr. Rice was ever known as open hearted and generous to a fault, ever ready to serve others and placing too light a value upon his services. With the opportunities and advantages at his command a more selfish and calculating man would have acquired wealth, but he attended alike upon rich and poor, and leaves the record of an honorable, well spent, useful life, and a monument of gratitude in many a heart in Oregon which shines beyond the clouds with brighter luster than the highest pyramid of gold.

He was a consistent and honored member of the Presbyterian Church for many years up to the time of his death.

DEATH OF A NOTED WOMAN.

The Founder of St. Mary's Academy and Mother Superior for the United States, Dies Suddenly.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., March 5.—Mother Angela, one of the most widely known women in this country, died very suddenly to-day at the St. Mary's Academy, an educational institution for females, which she founded in 1870 at Notre Dame. Mother Angela was a niece of Thos. Ewing, secretary of state under Wm. Henry Harrison, and was educated with her cousin, who is now the wife of General Sherman, at the Georgetown convent. She was also the cousin of Jas. G. Blaine, both being born in the same house in Brownsville, Pa., and passing their earlier years together. During her Washington life Mother Angela, then Miss Gillespie, was a much courted belle, noted for her learning and wit. When 26 years old she left society and joined the order of Sisters of the Holy Cross, and, coming to South Bend, where Rev. Father Sord had already founded the university of Notre Dame, and under her administration it became one of the most noted educational institutions in the country. In 1870 she became Mother Superior of the order for the United States. During the war of the Rebellion she devoted most of her time to the establishing of hospitals and overseeing the care of the sick and wounded soldiers. As Mother Superior of the United States she has founded a number of academies for women throughout the country.

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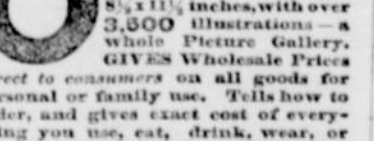
