We are informed the Althouse mail the latter part of last week was thoroughly saturated with coal oil and almost ruined. There is going to be an overhauling of routes before long, and somebody may pay the penalty of violating the postal laws.

The delinquent taxes of Josephine county at this time amount to \$425.40. This speaks volumes for the efficiency of our Sheriff's office.

The unfortunate Norwegian mentioned some time ago as having lost all his baggage while enroute to this country, has recovered it which will be a great benefit to him.

Rev. Mr. Black closed his protracted meetings at this place last Tuesday evening. Several conversions have been made in both the Baptist and Methodist churches recently.

We received this week a quart cup full of strawberries from the garden of our friend John Hood, which are the largest and finest we have seen. He has a large crop of these. Thanks.

Our esteemed friend Chas. K. Chanslor has returned from Portland where he attended the Grand Lodge I. O. O. F. The boy looks much improved from a few days rest.

W. B. Shepherd for three years superintendent of the celebrated Constock lode, expects to return to Gold Hill soon. He has great confidence in the mines of Southern Oregon.

Mr. Cogle, the gentleman who so fortunately discovered the celebrated Starve-out ledge, has made a rich and extensive strike on Coyote creek. He is certainly a valuable man to the community.

We understand three petitions are in circulation asking the county court to give a bounty on coyote scalps. They ought to give \$5, on old ones and \$2.50 on young ones caught prior to September 1st.

S. Messenger county commissioner, is somewhat improved from his severe sickness, but not sufficiently so to attend the special session of the county court this week. We hope soon to hear of his recovery.

Are the notices which were posted up in our town the first of the week "a chip off the old block?" Barnes got on all ships and do injure them but they run regularly nevertheless—they carry their cargoes and the barnacle too.

Quite a hail storm occurred down in Lee and Sandford's valley last Monday, doing considerable damage to fruit and vegetables. The strawberries receiving much damage in the way of grit thrown upon the large berries by the storm. It did not hail at this place.

The mail schedule from Applegate to Williams should be changed so as to accommodate that office. As it is, it takes from Thursday till Monday for letters to reach that office from Grants Pass. The start from Jacksonville should be after the train arrives.

The report raised somewhere in Jackson county that we were trying to have the mail route from Gold Hill to Spikenard discontinued is false, and shows how inventive and iaxative the human mind can be made. We have made no recommendations whatever with regard to that route.

The meetings conducted by Rev. Geo. W. Black of the Baptist church closed on Tuesday night with twenty-five conversions. There were seventeen additions to the Baptist church and eight to the Methodist church. The meetings closed with excellent feeling among the christian people of the town.

Dr. W. F. Kremer has a Canadian pony which is a perfect horse herder. He has a band of horses which he never allows to separate. Day in and day out he is ever vigilant and watchful over his band, and will whip them together so fiercely that they are afraid to separate. The fun is seen on our squares almost every day.

Ion. W. H. Wilson of Douglas county, who crossed the plains in 1848, was in town a few days ago. He was a member of one of our earliest legislatures, and is a pioneer in the truest sense of the term. He settled in that county in 1849. As he departed, he remarked: "I want to get back home in time to attend the pioneer reunion, and I think I will."

Rev. R. T. Riddle of Salem has been appointed by Presiding Elder Wilson to fill out the remainder of the Conference year on the Grants Pass circuit. He will spend the fifth Sabbath of each month at Kirbyville and vicinity and will preach on the fourth Sabbath at Wilderville. Mr. Riddle is a student of Willamette University. He is completely captivated with our town, country and climate.

There was quite an excitement in our office Tuesday over the ores brought by our editor from the Gold Hill mines. Several old miners looked at them all pronouncing them rich. Mr. Sterling a mining expert considered them rich. The latter gentleman remarked also that "there is more valuable quartz ledges undeveloped within 10 miles of Grants Pass than I ever saw before."

Robert McMullen an old resident of Josephine county who, so unfortunately lost his hand by the explosion of a stick of giant powder, while working last December in the Green mountain ledge, called on us last Saturday. He speaks in high terms of Dr. Hunter of Canyonville who attended him. He says he cannot account for the explosion of the powder. We thank the gentleman for favors.

Messrs. Sterling and Strickler report valuable quartz indications on Jewett mountain about 3 miles from town. Mr. Sterling is a mining expert which qualifies the report to some credit. He says it indicates a rich ledge.

Rev. J. P. Coleman will go to Ashland to deliver the oration at the Grand Army reunion next Monday. The citizens of this place will have the pleasure of hearing him speak next Sunday at Music Hall, on the occasion of the Grand Army reunion at this place, and we hope there will be a large turnout, as it is the first demonstration of the kind in the county.

Pursuant to notice in last week's COURIER, the citizens of Grants Pass met at the Court House Wednesday evening. On motion, W. J. Wimer was elected chairman, and R. G. Smith, secretary. A motion was carried that the City Council confer with the C. P. R. Co. as they deem wise, to secure stop-over immigrant tickets and other matters. A motion was carried that the chair appoint a committee of five whose duty it shall be to ascertain what amount of stock could be disposed of for the purpose of constructing water ditches on either side of the river. The chair appointed as such committee, J. M. Chiles, chairman, H. L. Benson, H. B. Miller, J. C. Campbell and J. T. Galvin. The meeting then adjourned, subject to a call of the committee.

The 11th annual meeting of the pioneers of Southern Oregon will be held in Jacksonville on June 2d. Throughout the length and breadth of Oregon these noble heroes are to be found. They are moving quietly now but they should never be classed with the moss back for they took their lives in their hands sacrificing home friends and all; toiling months and even years in the face of many and varied besetments not knowing what minute they were to be massacred by the ferocious savages who lined their pathway but they pressed onward wrenching the country from its wild and savage state placing it in our hands in peace. It is therefore our duty to take up the battle where they left off and develop the resources of the country and not theirs. Therefore do not call a pioneer a moss back any more than you would call the faithful soldier a traitor.

The Sturtevant shavings fan recently placed in the factory at this place, is a wonderful piece of machinery. It is adjusted to all of the important machines in the building on both floors, and carries the shavings away to the engine room to perfection. The plan upon which it works is a tubular system with a fan which gives sufficient suction to remove everything falling from such machinery as is used in working lumber. This is the only one of this kind in the state. A great many additions have recently been made to the machinery and buildings; in fact the company is continually adding improvements to the plant which is now the most complete factory of the kind within the state. Having heard it remarked that the factory would probably be removed from here, we asked Mr. Miller if such a thing was possible, to which he replied: "No, the factory will not be taken from this place. We may remove the saw mill to our timber up the railroad in time. In that event, the lumber will be graded at the mill as it is now and only such as we work will be shipped to the factory." "No," he added, "we have never talked of moving anything but the mill." Mr. Miller concluded by saying that since they had been successful in introducing yellow pine into market as a finishing lumber, they would be enabled to keep the mill here longer than they at first supposed.

Waldo notes say that Miss Ida Woodcock commenced school there Monday morning. J. C. Whipp, Jacksonville's energetic marble man was in that place enroute for Crescent City. Gussey Hart is sick with fever. The Wimer mines are running day and night. Bybee has closed down for the season.

Ennis, Simmons & Co. are making a good showing in their mammoth cut. Scott's Gulch is running under full head. The miners all expect a successful run.

County Court.

At the special session of the county court this week, the following business was transacted:

In the matter of the petition of S. B. Hathaway, et al. for a change of road near Jacob Wimer's place, it was ordered that Wm. Knox, Chas. Bradford and F. G. Day, be appointed viewers, and Wm. Saunders surveyor, and that they meet at the house of J. Lindsey at 8 o'clock, June 11th, 1887.

In the matter of the building of a bridge across the Applegate river at Custar's place, the contract was let to Hoffman & Bates at \$3,310 in toto, including planing and painting of structure.

R. R. Morris' resignation as constable for Grants Pass precinct was accepted.

T. J. Mackin was appointed Justice of the peace for Wolf creek precinct.

Costs of April term of circuit court amounting to \$794.70. Paid, Chas. K. Chanslor, circuit court fees amounting to \$126.30. Paid.

In the matter of the change of road near James Wimer's, S. B. Hathaway, C. C. Sumner and Andy Grimes were appointed viewers, and Wm. Saunders surveyor, to meet June 10th, 1887, at J. W. Wimer's.

In the matter of the change of road near T. P. Lee's place, reports of viewers accepted the road changed.

In the matter of the change of road from the house of W. A. Hunter. Report of viewers accepted and road ordered open. Sundry small bills were ordered paid, to the amount of \$169.44 C. K. Chanslor clerk fees \$172.95.

ED. COURIER—Dear Sir:—Knowing as I do that you are endeavoring to make your growing and valuable paper a medium of news, and as you are interested in the welfare of all, that a few items from this place might be of some interest.

The moral health in this community is improving. We have an interesting and large class in vocal music, and the people are applying themselves with an earnestness and zeal that is sure of its reward. They are taking steps also for the organization of a Sunday school to be held in the hall at this place. They have no regular preaching here yet, but are very desirous of having some good christian minister to visit them.

Crops are looking very fine in this vicinity. The frosts as yet, have not greatly damaged the fruits, as there will be some peaches and a fair crop of other fruits. I visited Wm. Robinson's farm and neighborhood on Rogue River the other day, where I saw some very fine farms and fine prospects of heavy crops if the season holds favorable, the frosts having done but little damage in that locality. Prof. Shattuck is farming forty acres of Mr. R.'s land in a systematic and skillful manner. The people in this part of the county, and generally in all parts of the county, feel that the COURIER is their friend irrespective of party, faction, clique or locality, and their general verdict is, that the "Times" in its issue of the 13th inst. is wilfully misrepresenting the people when it says "they are much disgusted with your disgraceful paper."

&c. Now, Mr. Editor, I don't intend to become the special defender of any man or paper or journal, but I am a defender of justice, and a despoiser of falsehood, and when the "Times" says that much dissatisfaction or disgust is felt, &c., among your patrons, and especially in this county, it says what is untrue.
