We were surprised on entering the office one morning this week to find a sample of luscious ripe peaches sitting on our table. They were large and fine. Enquiry elicited the fact that they were from the farm of Judge Volney Colvig.

The new store of Mrs. Stone on Front street, is now ready for occupation, and the owner is moving in her large stock of drugs etc. The new premises are neatly fitted up and the new store will be one of the most commodious and best appointed business places in the city. The work reflects credit upon the contractor, Mr. Catching.

Miss Ellen Adams who for seven months has made her home in the family of W. J. Wimer, started last Tuesday morning for Chico, Cal., where she expects to remain temporarily. She will return to Grants Pass again. We hope she may meet good friends, as she is in every way deserving of them. Her many friends will be glad to have her return soon.

Prof. J. S. Sweet, president of the State Normal School, at Ashland, called at our office on Thursday of this week. He reports his institution in a flourishing condition, and draws our attention to the fact that Josephine county is entitled to two free scholarships in the same. Candidates for these scholarships are to apply to the school superintendent of the county. No doubt there will be active competition for the positions.

By an oversight last week, we failed to mention the destruction by fire of a barn belonging to F. G. Burns, with several pieces of farm machinery, harness &c., also eight tons of hay, which occurred about 11 o'clock of the 3d inst. A horse tied to a wagon near by was cut loose in time to save him and the wagon pulled away and saved. Mr. B. thinks the fire must have been caused by matches which had been left in the trash, and ignited by the sun. This is an unfortunate affair and should warn others to be careful these dry times.

Some rich ledges of quartz have recently been struck in this vicinity with the result that everyone who can do so has gone, or is preparing to go, prospecting. There must be rich lodes undiscovered in these hills, and we believe that it is only a question of time when Grants Pass will be the center of a rich mining district. It might, however, be a great deal better for many of our people if they would remember that a few acres of well cultivated land are better than a dozen undeveloped quartz ledges to those who have no capital.

The calm repose that had settled down upon Grants Pass, consequent to harvest operations now going on, was slightly disturbed by the arrival of a camp of gypsies on Monday. Tuesday afternoon saw the outcome of the visit in a horse race between the gypsies' cart horse "Bunchgrass" and "Bonnie Bird," owned by the enterprising proprietor of the "Commercial." Quite a large crowd witnessed the contest. It goes without saying that the "Commercial" man got badly left. On Wednesday afternoon another race was run between "Bunchgrass" and the clever little grey pony owned by Smith of the livery stable. The gypsy forged ahead at the start and kept the lead throughout the race. The pony made the race both close and exciting, however, and was only a neck behind at the finish. We believe that Mr. Hutch has purchased the winning animal and thus laid the foundation for a racing stable.

The hanging of Kelly, the wife murderer, by a mob of masked men (a full account of which appears on our first page) must be regarded as a speedy meeting out of that justice which criminals of this nature so often escape. It is far from any design on our part to approve of lynch law and summary executions of this nature. The foundations of law and order require nothing but the utmost condemnation for this reckless interference with the course of justice. That the end was good does not by any means imply that the course was justified. It is the duty of officials to do their utmost to discover the perpetrators of this outrage against our laws and to punish them in a manner that will prevent the recurrence of such scenes in Oregon. The hanging of Hong Di, the Chinese murderer of Mrs. Billion, which occurred on the 10th at Colusa, Cal., was more excusable inasmuch as the jury found the man guilty of one of the most heinous murders ever perpetrated on the coast and yet failed to pronounce the extreme penalty upon him.

Charley Taylor, who has been working on the railroad in the Siskiyou for the past year, paid his family, in this city, a visit last week. He reports times lively at the front, plenty of work and good wages.

FRIENDS COUNTRYMEN—I am pleased to be able to report that the health of the southern part of our county is all that could be desired. Hay harvest is in full blast, and so far as I am a judge it appears to be a bountiful crop. The damage done by the early June frosts has been overcome by fresh planting of beans and other garden truck which is now coming on finely. It will perhaps be a little late, but we shall have an abundance of and by, and if you get short around Grants Pass, just drop us a postal and we will send a few wagon's full over to you.

I see by your valuable paper that friend Woodcock, the indefatigable, has located on the Rough and Ready quartz lode. For his age, this gentleman has the pluck of a dozen young men, and I sincerely hope he may find his reward by striking it rich. He certainly has selected a rough piece of country for his stamping ground. Perhaps it would not be presumptuous in me to advise him to look further in a westerly direction. The hills which break and empty their waters towards the sea coast are likely, at no distant day, to attract attention. The black sand, metallic iron, certainly must have found its way down there from the mountains.

Farmer Daley of Kerbyville, had a barn raising on Saturday, June 25th. The boys were all there in good spirits to lend him a hand, and they pushed the frame together at a lively rate and in short order. The day was a warm one, and the barn is being built in an exposed position. The sun was hot, the water warm, no ice, you see. The warm water and hot sun had a bad effect upon the workmen. Some became sleepy, others became pugnacious; in fact, I am inclined to believe that farmer Daley had been treating his friends to a dose of what they call laughing gas. But they were all right on Sunday.

The miners of Canyon and Josephine creeks being out of water, are turning their attention to river mining. One company has a wing dam in and will soon have their wheels and pump in operation on their claim on Illinois river, just below the mouth of Deer creek. This piece of river ought to pay well. The next company will operate in the river bed just above the mouth of Deer creek. Some of this ground was worked in the good old golden days and paid well, even then. There are several good bars along the river which have never yet been touched. There are miles of the Illinois river which will pay well. Large quantities of the fine gold of Waldo district was washed through the sluices in the old-time ways of washing, and was lost to the miners. This was all washed into the main streams and found a lodgment there. For years this has been going on, and the Illinois has been the constant repository. It is certain therefore, to pay when worked, if proper care is taken to collect and save the gold which is mostly very fine. Commence early, boys. The season is short, but there is money there.

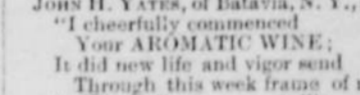
