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WHERE THE GOOD DIE OLD.

If You Would Live More Than a Century Emigrate to Mexico.

"I observe that when a man dies in this country at the age of 100 years or thereabouts the papers elaborate on the occurrence in their news columns as if it was something wonderful."

It is a limited area in the state of Tamaulipas whose climate, water and general conditions seem especially to conduce to longevity.

I visited the neighborhood a few months ago and there saw five generations of one name living in the same house. The oldest male was said to be 132 years old.

They are cut off from the rest of the world, and are ignorant as to the great population of the globe, nor do they seem to have the slightest conception as to the mode of life of other people.

They live in the most primitive way, and perhaps it is this absence of the tremendous pressure of modern civilization that largely conduces to their marvelous longevity."
