Pendleton City Council Looking for Some Means to Retrench in City Expenses.

The Pendleton city council is taking the financial affairs of that city with a fine-toothed comb to discover a place to further retrench.

The Coquille city board of school directors has decided on a 13 mill tax as sufficient to raise \$1500 the first installment of the cost of building a new schoolhouse.

The Unatilla County Agricultural Association is being organized in Unatilla county. It will be incorporated. The first meeting of the association was held Monday.

The Klondike excitement down in Curry county has given a boom to the skin trade. One man advertises that he wants 5000 coon skins, 5000 wildcat skins and 5000 fox skins.

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The Greater New York central committee of the Social Democracy of America, has sent an appeal to Governor Budd, of California, for the pardon of Walter D. Wood.

D. A. Jones has received a letter from Oregon announcing the mysterious disappearance of his uncle, D. D. Blinn, of Clatskanie, a pioneer citizen and expressing fear that he has met foul play.

The senate committee on commerce authorized the reporting of a bill in accordance with the recommendation of the treasury department, establishing a steamboat inspectors' district for Alaska.

Some afternoon papers report the absence of the Russian and German ambassadors at the Marquis of Salisbury's regular Wednesday reception to the diplomatic corps as being of disquieting portent.

Governor Budd granted W. D. Worden, awaiting execution at Folsom prison for participating in the wrecking of the overland train in Yolo county in 1894, another reprieve until June 17 of this year.

When the steamer Queen left Tacoma recently for Skagway and Dyea she had on board 1030 passengers and 1200 tons of freight. Below decks there was a perfect menagerie in the way of food and draught animals.

There has been a pitched battle between cowboys and cattle thieves west of Glasgow, near the Dakota line. One of the thieves is reported dead and the cowboys are in pursuit of the other members of the gang, who have crossed into Dakota.

The report that in case of the annexation of Hawaii the Japanese residents of the island would be given all the rights of citizenship, is absolutely false. The various newspapers printing the yarn have been hoaxed by emissaries of the sugar trust.

Judge Freeman in the superior court of Chicago, has laid down the dictum to the effect that insanity cannot be pleaded as a ground for divorce either on the part of man or wife. This is said to be the first judicial expression on this point in the history of the country.

President Cuestas, of Uruguay, is about to publish a decree dissolving congress, says the Herald correspondent in Montevideo. All the troops in Uruguay are under arms by order of the president, who has taken this method to promptly suppress any outbreak that may come.

The president sent to the senate the 4th from Ethel Haddock, of Missouri, now envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary to Russia, a cablegram received Wednesday indicating the intention of Russia to raise the rank of their representative here to that of an ambassador, and this government responded promptly with the action taken today.

Quarantine barriers are being established in all towns against the Bombay exodus. Lord Saurashtra, the governor, fearing that the plague will increase rapidly in a few weeks, and that through the penning of the large population, a panic is likely to develop, issued an order inviting those affected to remove themselves and their families to a camp on the islands across the harbor.

Prince George, the correspondent asserts has been informed, and is ready to depart for Crete under the tripartite protection.

AUSTRALIAN BEE HUNT. How the Natives Find the Well-Filled Hives. An Australian savage comes up to an Irishman's idea of human skill, for "he beats the bees." A native seldom fails to get honey when he discovers the bee has been watching for it. The following description of a native's bee hunt is given in Mr. Arthur's "Kangaroo and Kauri."

Wardell, the chief of a tribe, went with two little nets to a small pool, filled his mouth with water, and then lying down, his head hanging over the pool, he remained quiet for an hour, apparently looking at his own reflection in the water. The hum of a bee was heard. Buzz-z-z-z it went over the pool, round the bee's head, now on one side, now on the other, and now close to his ear. I saw not a motion betraying the bee hunter.

But when the bee, dropping close to the water, gave notice by the change of tone, that it was about to sip, the chief, with a great start, seized the net from his mouth over the little "buzz-z-z-z." Before it had time to recover from the unexpected drench, he seized it dexterously by the wings.

Then he prepared it for the chase by fastening it to a bunch of wild cotton with some gum. The bee was let go and made for his hive, slowly at first, and then with a great start, as if he had found the air for the chase to follow. He was followed by the man of the tribe, and in half an hour he had at the foot of his net a small gum tree, into whose top the bee had gone.

The chief mounted quickly, by cutting toches into the bark with his knife, and in a short time he brought down a quantity of honeycombs, a small piece of which contained honey. The Australian bees are stingless.

Potatoes for Children. A mother who is an authority on foods advises mothers to give their children potatoes only twice a week, and then only those that are baked. Give them boiled rice the other five days, and some delicate green vegetables.

SYRUP OF FIGS. Parbail, half pound rice for a few minutes in water and drain in a colander. Put the rice in a deep dish, add a quart of water, and let it stand over night. In the morning, add a pint of milk, three tablespoonsful sugar, half tablespoonful butter, half teaspoonful salt and boil till tender; when done remove it from the fire and mix with the juice of three or four lemons, the grated rind of one lemon and set it aside to cool; form the mixture into balls the size of a walnut, dip them in beaten white of egg, roll them in floured crumbs and fry in Philadelphia Press.
