Bids Wanted for Irrigating Ditch.

Bids will be received at the office of
the Sugar Pine Door & Lumber Com-
pany, by H. B. Miller, up to March 1st,

for the construction of an irrigating ditch
to be taken out of Applegate river near
the mouth of Slate creek for the dis-

tance of 113 rods, said ditch to be three
feet wide at the bottom, slope in three
feet wide at the top, and in rock sufficient

for safety; the ditch to be constructed
according to the location stakes already
set. Marks on stakes indicate the bot-

tom of the ditch. The average cut is
about five feet.
Bids will be received for the construc-

tion of the ditch complete, also for ex-
cavation of earth and loose rock per
yard and solid rock per yard.

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
