Monday John A. Jeffrey, the fusion candidate for circuit judge of this judicial district, addressed quite a large audience at the court house. The speaker was introduced to the crowd by H. C. Perkins. Mr. J. seemed to be in a happy mood. He commenced by saying that the office for which he was a candidate was a judicial one, and that many persons would construe it as being undignified and out of place for a candidate to make political speeches for a non-partisan office, but that he took a different view of the matter, that he could see nothing wrong in discussing public questions before the people in an important campaign, that all the candidates for circuit judge would doubtless go out on a par, still, but that he believed in an open field fight. He then branched out on the general issues of the day. He handled the gold bugs, as he styled the adherents of the single gold standard, without gloves, and made them out very naughty people. He then cracked a few state jokes, after which he relapsed into silence. Mr. E. C. Wade was then called out, but declined to make a speech. He said, however, that before the campaign closed he would be pleased to address the people of Grants Pass; that if elected judge he would do his duty faithfully and honestly; that he would have no enemies to punish nor friends to reward.

Monday evening an old mountaineer and prospector, while crossing a trestle near West Fork, lost his balance and fell off the bridge a distance of 90 feet. Sustaining injuries from which he soon died. A brakeman on a north-bound freight train crossing the trestle discovered the unfortunate man and the train was stopped. The man was conscious and said he had a sister in Roseburg where he desired to be taken. His request was complied with, but he died between Myrtle Creek and Riddle.

The spring term of circuit court convened Monday, April 18, with Judge W. C. Hale on the bench, J. A. Jeffrey district attorney, by G. W. White deputy, J. G. Hiatt, sheriff, J. W. Howard, clerk, by E. W. Kuykendall deputy.

Grand jury drawn were Edgar Bricker, Dave Bonr, W. L. Babcock, J. W. Harmon, A. W. Nancke, E. I. Bailey and F. G. Burns. Edward Bailey was appointed foreman.

Geo. Slover was appointed grand jury bailiff, and Fred Hassman court bailiff.

State vs Ed Cornelius, indictment for selling and giving liquor to minors, on motion of district attorney, was dismissed for want of evidence.

State of Oregon vs Chas. Flester, order entering mandate from supreme court and setting time for passing sentence on Thursday, April 21st at 2 p. m.

Grand jury found not a true bill in state of Oregon vs James Roe, charged with giving intoxicating liquor to minors; also same in state vs L. Parker, assault with a dangerous weapon.
