The mining outlook is very bright in Josephine county. Capital is seeking investment. Some sales are being made and mining men are happy. The dry season has worked a hardship on the placer miners, but it has stimulated the development of the more permanent source of wealth, the quartz mines. If we can now have one good season for the placers, prosperity will smile broadly upon Josephine county.

The assassination of the Empress of Austria continues to agitate all Europe. The beloved empress may yet work great good even in her death. If all civilized nations, awakening to the fact that the anarchists are a horde of vermin that constantly menace the life of society and will take concerted action to stamp them out, the life of Austria's empress will not have been sacrificed in vain.

A member of the council is reported as saying that he wanted to see "as many saloons as churches in Grants Pass." For the honor of our city we hope this is not true. We hope that within our limits we have nothing that we hope he did not know what he was talking about. If he did, then the sooner Satan foresees his mortgage on his property, the better for humanity as a whole.

We hope to be able to say after the close of the Southern Oregon fair that there was a grand improvement in the exhibits. The speed program of any fair is essential, but it is the one factor that gathers together the sports, and too much sport tends to the destruction of principle. Improvements in all kinds of stock, the best products of the farm and the orchard should receive the highest encouragement and for those the best premiums should be given, otherwise any fair will not receive the support of the better class of people.

The long dry season has emphasized the necessity for taking steps to secure for this valley an adequate water supply. A ditch taken out above Gold Hill, as has so often been suggested, while expensive in the beginning, would pay for itself in mining and agriculture in two or three years of drought. An increase in the value of property along its line would almost compensate for the outlay immediately. With sewers and an abundant water supply Grants Pass, with its natural resources would quickly double in population. What we lack just now is nerve. A policy that will now abundantly will bring an abundant harvest.

Our military men are in danger of losing all the honor gained in the war through their unseemly personal squabbles. Miles wants it understood that to him belongs the honor of the Santiago campaign. Shafter doesn't say much, but looks knowing. The friends of Sampson and Slocum were warm over the claims of their respective heroes. The yellow journals pitch into the secretary of war and prove conclusively that those of our soldiers who did not die of disease, perished of starvation or for want of hammocks. What a shame and disgrace! It degrades us in the sight of the world and lowers the morals of our army. Uncle Sam needs badly a huge spanking machine.

The Sultan evidently thinks he is strong enough to defy the powers. Since his victory over the Greeks, he has felt his oats exceedingly. At first he flatly refused to withdraw his troops from Crete and charged upon the British the responsibility for the outbreak at Candia. This generation is reaping the fruits of England's intervention in the Crimea. The best thing that England can do will be to use her great fleet to wipe out the Turk, and thus avenge her crime against humanity in leaving protected him. As we also have a little account for the destruction of the property of our missionaries, perhaps we might lend our fleets to help out in the benevolent work.

It would be an interesting psychological study to follow the workings of the anarchist mind from boyhood, until tramping upon all law and all the nobler feelings of the human breast, he plunged his dagger into the heart of a noble woman, whose only crime was the accident of birth. It would be found that the beginning of the end was in an utter disregard for law. Anarchists in embryo are thronging our streets—being manufactured by society, as it is at present organized. Disregard for law by those in high positions, begets a law disregard in low places. The violation

unimproved, of any law, is blood to the tiger. The safety of society depends in no small degree upon reverence for, and obedience to, all lawfully constituted authority.

The question of granting a license for another saloon to be located in Howard's block still hangs fire in the council. We sincerely hope that those to whom we have entrusted our business interests will not grant such license. There is no crying need for another saloon. Those that we have already furnish a reasonable amount of business for the police judge. Then the effect upon the business interests of the town should be considered. It is a significant fact that our great business houses and corporations are drawing the line more and more closely on drinking men. Carroll D. Wright, United States commissioner of the land, inquires were made at 7525 establishments employing 1,800,000 men. More than half the employees stated that they required abstinence from intoxicating liquors, either entirely or when on duty. The principal reasons given were that intoxicating liquors unfitted men for good work, for responsible positions and were the prolific cause of accidents. We do not need any more establishments that will take from man his ability to maintain his position in the struggle of life.

There is little doubt but that the growing sentiment in favor of the retention of the Philippine islands will powerfully influence the administration in the settlement of the terms of peace. Naturally the Atlantic coast does not view the proposition with favor, as it is for the interest of the Atlantic coast manufacturers and importers to extend their trade in the other direction, but the interests of the Pacific coast require a different policy. The American nation has reached a point where markets must be found for her manufactured goods, else our industries will expand but slowly. No more promising field offers itself than that of China when a nation of four hundred millions is just awaking from its long sleep and seeing the need of all the adjuncts of modern civilization. China with its great resources promises to be the great world market and it will be a wise policy to keep the strong hold that we have gained on her coasts to safeguard our interests. The construction of the Nicaragua canal will open this door also to our Atlantic friends. For a time it seemed as if England had been out-matched by Russia in diplomacy in the Orient. The skilled diplomats of the Czar had gained the ascendancy in the Chinese court and England was under a cloud; but the tables are again turned and English diplomacy has recovered the lost ground. In the interests of civilization and commerce it is to be hoped that Great Britain will retain her influence there until China is thoroughly awakened. It means much to the great manufacturing people.

District Fair.
On Tuesday, September 27th, begins the district fair for Southern Oregon, an enterprise in which all are interested and which benefits, in a direct way, every locality in the district. Josephine county embraces a large part of the First Southern Oregon Agricultural district and it is especially desired that a good representation of the county be made at the fair. The chief object of the Association is to encourage better breeding of stock and raising of a better and finer quality of fruit and vegetables. This county produces some fine specimens both in the stock, horticultural and agricultural lines and it is earnestly hoped that farmers and fruit raisers generally will take an interest in this matter, and by making an exhibit at the fair, show up some of the resources of this county.

As an encouragement to those who wish to aid this good work, the proprietors of the B. & M. store have kindly offered to box and ship such specimens of the different products as may be left at their store before noon of Monday, September 20th. Never was there a better opportunity for showing the riches of this county for the specimens, whether fruit or vegetables, will be put up as an exhibit from Josephine county, as labeled, and each exhibitor's name attached to the display made by himself. Mr. Croxton, one of the fair commissioners, will see to the proper placing and labeling of the exhibits.

Again, the management secured special reduced rates of one and one third fare thus making the round trip to Medford about \$1.75, and this fact, together with the reduction in freight, should insure both a large attendance and a good exhibit.

Several new features have been added which give special attraction to different days. Wednesday is set for the Ladies' Equestrian exhibition, a purse of \$100 being offered as first prize and a handsome riding whip as second prize. The two articles constituting the second prize were generously donated by Medford merchants, D. L. Lawton and J. G. Taylor. For Thursday is the Equestrian mile race and those who witnessed the laughable spectacle last year with hardly a trot to be on hand. Thursday, September 29th.

Friday is Medford day, and school day as well. Both business houses and schools closing and the school children of the different districts marching to the grounds.

On Saturday occurs the event of the week, when competent judges will undertake to determine which of the scores entered is the prettiest baby. The prizes for the handsomest lady and the

Santiago After the Surrender.
[CONTINUED FROM FIRST PAGE.]

We returned from the Spanish trenches in time to do some shopping, not much tired by a ten mile tramp. The city had become alive with Spanish soldiers and they were selling everything that they possessed. The contingents of war correspondents from the Aransas had had no chance for many days to spend money. Bargaining for machetes was going on with Spaniards on all sides. They were bought for prices varying from \$1 to \$6. I secured one with a horn handle from a soldier, and a Cross of San Fernando, equivalent to the Victoria Cross of the British army, from another. We walked along the street until we met a soldier who possessed something which we wished to buy. We touched it and said:

"Quanto pesa?" would come the answer with the most surprising alacrity, though probably the man had never before considered selling it.

"No, no!" we would say shaking our heads.

"Si, si!" he would reaffirm.

"Free peso?"

"No, no!" with a wave of the finger. If we could agree on a price in Spanish he handed over the thing we wished in American money. In the meantime a great crowd of people would gather about and goggle and frown sympathetically. Buttons off the men's coats were very popular, chevrons, decorations—anything. The stores drove the briskest trade of months. Some of our officers had come over from camp to see about their tents still aboard the transports—which now filled the harbor as it never had been filled before—and stopped to purchase soap and other luxuries. We bought fans, indicating what we wanted by waving our outspread hand back and forth. I inquired for clay water bottles or "monkeys," and they directed me to a valise store. A tooth brush was purchased by some pointed gestures.

Many of our number patronized the Venus Cafe where they got the best that the city afforded (which was not much) at exorbitant prices. The proprietor had recently been a colonel of Spanish volunteers, but now he was a full-fledged Cuban and took extreme pains to impress the fact of his new-found sympathies on the "Americans." There were many Spaniards in Santiago who turned Cuban about that time on short notice.

We went straggling back to the Aransas laden with goods of all descriptions. One man had three great clay water bottles dangling across his back and an armful of machetes. Another had fanned on shawls and mantillas and fans. Some had succeeded in purchasing clothing; this was especially fortunate in the case of a representative of a Boston paper, who had been forced to clothe himself for a fortnight past in a pair of bright pink pajamas.

A crowd still surged about the Red Cross warehouse—Spanish soldiers, Cuban men, women and children, negroes, half-breeds, all mingling amicably together and kept at a distance by soldiers of the Ninth Infantry, detailed to do guard duty there. Further up the street outside of a sort of "diet kitchen" where the food was to be distributed, some thousands of hungry people were gathered waiting, hungry eyed, for bread.

Santiago had been a surprise to us. We had not expected to find it so full of smiling peace and good humor. Hunger had come, but not starvation, and we were spared any awful glimpses of returning reconcentrados. It seemed as if on all sides one feeling had taken root and grown steadily—that of "good will towards men." By Anna Northend Benjamin in the September Outlook.
