Ruben and Grave creek mining districts and other claimants in the Kerby and other districts are told to contemplate in the near future a move in the same direction. H. C. Perkins, United States Deputy Mineral Surveyor made, last week, reports of examination for mineral patents for F. J. Campbell and others of Denver, Col. on two different tracts of placer mining ground in the Grave creek district, aggregating 220 acres. This is a matter of congratulation to the people of this county and one to which we have frequently had occasion to revert. Heretofore the brunt of taxation has been chiefly borne by the agricultural and other interests of the county from the fact that the mining lands were not patented and therefore only the improvements were taxable.
