The apple crop is being handled lively now that the winter season is rapidly approaching. The Earl Fruit company is shipping a great many. Up to the present time there has left this depot 30 carloads with the Earl Fruit company's warehouse full and more coming in. There will be not less than 40 or 50 carloads during the shipping season.

Hop Moving.

The hop raisers are feeling much better this year than usual as far better prices prevail. The prices range from 13 to 15 cents a pound. Up to the present time only two carloads have been shipped from the Grants Pass depot.
