In this issue may be found the semi-annual reports of the city officers. Read them, please them.

Again it is reported that President Chapman of the university will tender his resignation this time at the close of the university year. It is to be hoped that the report has a firm foundation.

The Roseburg Review is authority for the statement that nearly \$50,000 has been paid for prizes this fall in the vicinity of Myrtle Creek, Riddle and Canyonville. Who says that fruit raising does not pay in Southern Oregon?

The city charter should be amended giving the mayor and council authority to appoint the marshal. This would not necessarily diminish expenses, but it would without doubt increase efficiency. By all means the change should be made.

Archbishop Gross died in Baltimore, Md., November 14th. He was an able man and highly respected by the people in general throughout the Northwest as well as by those of his own church. Oregon was truly his home but he was laid to rest in his native state.

It will not be surprising if Teddy Roosevelt makes it tropical for McKinley in the Republican National convention for the presidency two years hence. There is no abiding time these days in politics, but where a politician sees a possibility he takes time by the forelock and wades in.

The supreme court has advanced the case of Frank Lawrence Smith who was convicted for murder in Jackson county and is now in jail at Jacksonville, to be heard November 21. If the Supreme court sustains the lower court, Smith will soon pay the penalty of the law, and will not languish in jail for three or four years.

The trouble in the South especially in Wilmington, N. C., between the whites and blacks over the election became so serious that a number of lives were lost. It all grows out of who shall be the predominant influence in governmental affairs; whether it shall be the white or the black. Ignorance and superstition, and that is the Negro as a mass, can not rule in the face of enlightenment. The Negro will never be allowed to rule in the South and that is the end of it.

In the event the peace commissioners fail to come to a definite conclusion, it has been suggested that Emperor William of Germany be asked to arbitrate the differences. This suggestion must come from Spain as no sane American would dare harbor such a thought. Think of it, William of Germany arbitrating a question in which the United States government is interested. It is hardly to be anticipated that Spain will break up the commission by withdrawing, and then appeal to the powers to gain by such a course. It becomes the United States as a great and just nation to deal leniently with the vanquished foe and not harshly. It is not dealing harshly with her when her colonies are given a better form of government, although the home government loses its revenue.

It is said that the American and Spanish commissioners now sitting at Paris have under consideration a proposition from a commercial company to buy outright the Philippine islands for the sum of \$300,000,000. J. B. Young of Utah, son of Brigham Young, is the principal exponent for the company. It is also said that McKinley looks with some favor upon the scheme, but this we seriously doubt. The fact that a son of old Brigham Young is one of the prime factors in the enterprise is prima facie evidence that the commissioners should turn even a thought of such a thing. There can be but one ultimate object in view and that the permanent establishment of a governing power in the islands. It would be better for the inhabitants of the Philippines, to be left alone forever, or be cast to the bottom of the sea than to fall into the hands of these so-called Latter Day Saints. It is to be hoped that the United States government can see further into the future than it did when Utah was a state.

Needs Attention.

Again it is reported the old story that it is difficult to heat up the school room to a point of comfort for teachers and pupils. The reason why is simple, for in the first place the furnaces are not in good condition, and in the second place the wood is not suitable. It is time the school board was learning that the contract to supply wood for the school ought to be let now for next year's supply. The wood ought to be cut and piled up for the summer's seasoning by March 1st, next, and then put into the basement of the school building by the time school opens next fall. This would insure good wood with no more cost comparatively than at present.

Poor furnaces and green wood cannot be economy on the other hand, it is a great loss for teachers and pupils cannot do proper work when they are compelled to be in a cold or smoky room a quarter or half day. It is to be hoped that the school board will give a little more attention to these matters and not

allow them to occur every year. There is no economy in it but the contrary, when viewed from the right standpoint. Teachers are employed to do certain work, but when prevented from doing the work because of insufficiencies, it becomes the people to know why the trouble. Time in the school room is value, and a loss of time is a loss of value to the children. We know from personal experience, with what the teachers have to contend and we know also that the people cannot afford to pay a heavy tax to support a good school, and then have it crippled. Prof. Holmes is doing good work—murmurs little at the obstacles to be overcome—but in his efforts to advance our public schools to the highest excellency, he must be supported by the people.

Where is He?
About two years ago, John Pulzer who has a quartz mine on Jump-off-Joe, got acquainted with a man at Cottonwood, California by the name of Frank Janak, who had a son by the name of Joe, a young man some where in the twenties.

The old gentleman Janak learning of Mr. Pulzer's mining operations in this section, came to him last spring, seeking a partnership with him for his boy. He bought a half interest in the mine, which prior to Pulzer's purchase, belonged to Lee & Vannoy. The young man took possession with his partner, Mr. Pulzer, as best we can learn about May 1st, and the two proceeded to work together. Mr. Pulzer was well pleased with his partner for he proved himself a hard worker, but it developed in a short time that he was subjected to epileptic fits, and in order that he might receive medical aid with hopes of ultimate recovery, Mr. Pulzer and Mr. Bennett advised him to go to Portland to the hospital for treatment. The young man took the advice, came to town, bought a piece of iron for the arrastra, which was sent to the mine by the mail carrier and left, it is supposed, on the evening train for Portland. He has not been heard from since, although the father in California and Mr. Pulzer have made every effort to discover his whereabouts, but all in vain. He had on his person \$140 and being unaccustomed to the ways of the world, it is thought that possibly his money was taken from him but not until he was perhaps murdered. The father says something serious has befallen him else he would have returned. Where can he be?

Here It Is.
The present city council has made strenuous efforts to keep down expenses this year, curtailing everywhere, making no improvement, but doing their very best to keep the expenses below the income for the same length of time. Were it not for the interest which must be paid, they have succeeded, but counting interest the city went behind last year approximately \$550.

Gleaming the treasurer's books we obtained those figures which show about how it is running. The amount of warrants issued from November 1, '97 to November 1, '98, together with the interest on outstanding warrants, which is really the amount paid out by the city in the year, is \$4915.13. The amount received from funds, license and tax for the same time is about \$4547.42, making a deficit of \$367.71. Of course in estimating the income no account was taken of \$100 which the city got because of the sale of a lot for the reason that it was not a regular source of revenue. The above figures may not be absolutely cor-

rect but they are approximately so and will give the people a pretty clear idea of how it is.

Mr. Haskins Speaks.
EDITOR COURIER, Dear Sir: I beg permission to use a little space in your valuable paper to explain something about that much talked of occupation tax, now being considered by the city council. As a member of the committee to arrange rates on the several different occupations I would like to say that it was presented to the council differently from that arranged by the committee in regard to the lumber business mentioned. The planing mills were left out, which, as the committee had ordered would cause the lumber dealers to pay fully as much proportionally as any other business. As to barber shops, the rates at \$10 we thought to be not exorbitant in proportion to others as they pay no other taxes on their business; certain barbers had asked the committee to place tax at \$100, so we thought if they could pay \$100 they surely could pay \$10. In regard to dressmaking, that was rated at \$5, not \$10 as it appeared, and I will say farther that we had a logical reason in all cases of rates and did not go at it in a haphazard way as your paper mentioned. I would state also that I was apposed from the first to a tax of that kind no matter what the rate would be and had intended to do all I could to kill any measure of that kind when it came to a vote. TOQUES MADE AT HOME.

Good Use That May Be Made of Odd Bits of Velvet, Feathers and Tulle.

Here are a few half-season toques that, with a little ingenuity, odd bits of velvet, tulle and feathers, can be made at home, over well-shaped wire frames. A fascinating arrangement in mouse-colored velvet, all wrinkled horizontally and resting against the hair, is crossed in front by a loosely draped knot in light gray satin. The height of the knot being a twist of pearly blue velvet.

Another coquettish little headress is of pearly blue velvet, drawn to the front in two sharp reverses. Over the flaring back reverses is a high-lifted, irregular bow, knotted from a bias piece of lavender taffeta, the center of the bow being a twist of pearly blue velvet. Two fancy pearl hairpins, with filigree mounting, are stuck jauntily in the front of the bow. The arrangement of the pins is nail-fashion, as though they served to tack the bow to the bonnet.

An outline and twist about the small body of the toque are made of a fine, riching of lavender mousseline de soie.

Matching a street gown, out of the cloth of which it is made, is a poppy-red toque, artfully draped and raised at the left side with a knot of velvet, poppies, with seedy black centers. Above the poppies is an aggressive spreading of four lively red wings. An ornament of cut jet is allowed to show vaguely among the poppies. Black tulle is effectively combined on a toque frame with a rolling twist of black velvet.
