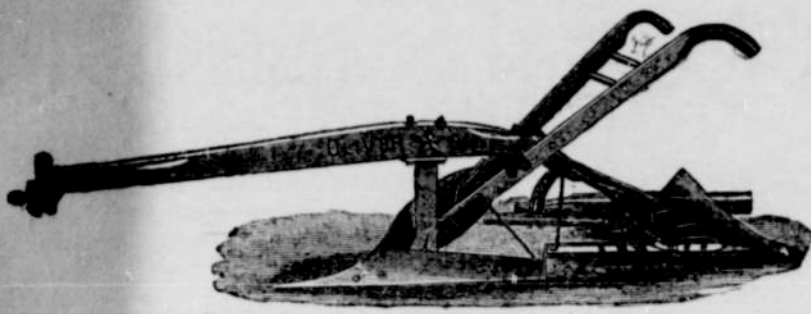

Obituary.

Captain Robert Pool was born in England, April 17, 1839, and when, but four years old moved to this country with his parents, settling in Southern Wisconsin. At the age of 18 he went to Galena, Ill., where he engaged as clerk in a store for a number of years. When the war broke out he was ready to respond to his country's call and entered the service as 2nd lieutenant, and later was promoted to 1st lieutenant. After the battle of Lookout Mountain in which he took an active part, while in camp one night during a storm a tree fell on him in his tent, breaking both his legs, which prevented him from active service for some time.

Serving his country faithfully for three and a half years, he was then regularly mustered out of the service, returning to the clerkship at Galena, Ill. After a brief service in the store he concluded to try his fortune in the mines of Montana, remaining in that section for six years, when he returned to Illinois where the people honored him by a call to the office of sheriff of Jo Davies county, which position he held for two terms of two years each.

Health failing, in the spring of 1883 he came out to Oregon and located in Ashland where he remained for two and a half years, thence moving with his family to this place where he resided until called away from things earthly.

Shortly after moving to Grants Pass he was stricken with paralysis from the effects of the accident that befell him during the war. He soon became perfectly helpless and remained in this condition until last Saturday morning about 5 o'clock, when he passed away as calmly as if but asleep, leaving a wife, one daughter and two sons to weep over his departure.

The pulpit has produced many an excellent sermon, but none more effective than the past ten years of this man's life. He could truly be called the model man, for he patiently did his long and arduous duty without a word of murmuring. Seemed perfectly resigned to his fate, believing that it was not right to murmur against Him who ordains whatsoever comes to pass.

Captain Pool is dead, yet he must still live in the lives of others who could not help but learn from him the lesson of perfect patience.

The remains were taken in charge by the Masonic Fraternity of which order the deceased was a member, and conducted to the Presbyterian church where Rev. Robert McLean pronounced a brief and appropriate funeral eulogy, followed by Rev. Jenkins of the Methodist church who spoke a few words of comfort. After the service at the church, the body was borne to the cemetery where the order in a beautiful service consigned it to the earth, to there remain until the Resurrection morn.
