

Text of the Treaty.

Third, criminal actions pending on the aforementioned date before the supreme tribunal of Spain against citizens of the territory which according to the treaty will cease to be Spanish shall continue under its jurisdiction until definite sentence is pronounced, but once sentence is decreed the execution shall be entrusted to the competent authority of the place where the action arose.

"Article 13—Literary, artistic and industrial rights of property acquired by Spaniards in Cuba, Porto Rico, the Philippines and other territories ceded on the interchange of ratifications of this treaty shall continue to be respected. Spanish scientific, literary and artistic works which shall not be dangerous to public order in territories shall continue under their jurisdiction with freedom from all customs duties for a period of ten years, dating from the interchange of ratification of this treaty.

"Article 14—Spain may establish consular agents in ports and places of territory whose renunciation or cession are the object of the treaty.

"Article 15—The government of either country shall concede for a term of ten years to merchants ships of the other country the same treatment as regards all port dues, including those of entry and departure, light dues and tonnage, as it concedes to its own merchant ships not engaged in the coasting trade. This article may be repudiated at any time by either government giving previous notice thereof six months beforehand.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19, 1908.—Crumenation has brought the expansion question very much to the front in Washington. President McKinley's speech at Atlanta, in which he asked, "Who will haul down the flag?" is regarded as committing him in favor of expansion and of the Philippines, and it has caused the expansionists in congress and out of congress. Then came Colonel Bryan's visit to Washington for the double purpose of trying to prevent senators of his party opposing the ratification of the treaty of peace, which he said should not figure in the fight against expansion, and of solidifying his party in both branches of congress against expansion. He succeeded so well in the first that it is generally expected that the treaty will be ratified by the senate before the end of this session of congress.
