The Discoveries of the Century.

Last week we briefly alluded to a re-
capitulation, by Alfred Russell Wallace,
of the inventions and discoveries of the
century. Some, which are of the first
importance, were omitted, possibly be-
cause not yet established in England.
We will take suggestions from this book,
and make additions in their appropriate
places. And first in physical philosophy,
the working theories:

The wave theory of light.
Molecular theory of matter.

Conservation and correlation of energy.
Meteorological theory of the cosmos.

Vibratory theory of atoms.
Variations and survival of species.

The cell theory of organisms.
The unity of the constitution of the
universe.

The vortex theory of atoms.
The following sciences came into ex-
istence during the century: Geology,
Biology, Philology, Botany, History as a
science, Psychology, Sarcology, the
Spectroscopic Analysis of Light, the re-
construction of Chemistry, Archaeology.

Among the principal great inventions
in applied force are these: The harvest-
er and threshing cotton gin, sewing ma-
chine, planing machine and a great va-
riety of wood working appliances, the
diamond drill, high explosives, steam
elevators or lifts, the Fordinier paper
