Co. as foreman in the wash and door department, working for this Company until about one year ago when his health failed him on account of the many years spent in the dust of the shops.

Mr. Kinney bore his affliction with patience, resigning himself to what he must have realized would soon come to pass, and he died with a peaceful soul. He was a noble citizen and one well liked by those who knew him, and his taking away will be mourned by his wife and daughter, by relatives and by many friends.

Funeral services were preached by Rev. Dr. Thomson, at the Presbyterian church to a large audience, after which the Masonic Fraternity, of which the deceased was a member, took charge of the body and laid it to rest in the Masonic cemetery.
