Had the troops come immediately to Portland, the demonstration that would have excelled anything ever known in the state, but it will hardly be so great now since the boys prefer the little money to the enthusiasm in their behalf. A private's pay in Uncle Sam's service is very little at best and we cannot expect the boys for wanting to get every cent there is in it, but we hate to see the people of the state lose the opportunity to show their appreciation of work well done.

The newspaper correspondents at Manila are of the opinion that Otis is not equal to the occasion in the matter of carrying on the war in the Philippines. They have agreed to go to Portland in body, but the mustering out in San Francisco will take some three weeks and then the boys may go to Portland by water. The militia boys still believe that all is not yet lost, and expect to be called to Portland in the near future.

For the purpose of having the best of the hardships and privations of war, a camp was established for a night or two on the other side of the river, and some of the boys went out and stayed there and cooked, ate, and slept there like real soldiers.

When the boys go to Portland, they want it understood that they will be in no peril of death either by starvation or indignation as they are amply provided with excellent cooks.

Daniel Snyder Killed at Gold Hill. On Sunday evening last, the north-bound California express (first section) struck and instantly killed Daniel Snyder of this town. He was walking on the ties on the right hand side of the track going toward the bridge and being very dead did not hear the train coming, and wearing his hat low over his eyes did not, probably, see it. Carried along to him but he did not appear to hear, and in another instant the train struck him full in the face, neck and breast. It was a horrifying sight. The left side of his face was smashed in, neck broken and left arm broken in three places. Poor old man, he never knew what struck him, as he was killed instantly.

Dealing in Deer Hides. One Olsson of West Fork, while bringing a large number of deer hides to this city to sell last Wednesday, was apprehended by our game warden and the skins were confiscated. On Thursday, Olsson was given a jury trial in Justice Miller's court and was convicted of unlawfully transporting deer hides and fined \$50 and costs, in default of which he was committed to jail. J. Dusch, proprietor of the Roseburg tannery, was also tried Thursday afternoon before the justice upon a charge of unlawfully handling deer skins and converting them into merchandise, and was found guilty as charged. He was fined \$100 which was promptly paid. His brother also has been arrested on a charge of unlawfully handling deer hides, but has not been convicted. The penalty in these cases is fixed by statute at a fine of \$100 to \$500, or imprisonment, or both. It is said other ardent sportsmen will soon follow. The game warden is going to see that the law is enforced at all hazards.—Roseburg Plaindealer.

Scotch Opinion of United States Goods. In this market, American manufactures, with few exceptions, are above the average in point of quality. To be more specific, the articles of American make sold here, either to a large or limited extent, have gained acceptance on account of quality rather than on account of comparative cheapness. They are better for the money than like articles produced here or on the continent. It is distinctly true, however, to say that our products have obtained favor in Scotland and are gaining favor on the merits. Wherever one goes in this country he finds the opinion prevailing that American manufactures and other products are up to the best standard. Generally speaking, it is considered in Scotch communities that to say an article is American is to commend it. The exceptions are not yet conspicuous and are confined to certain grades of bicycles thrown on the market a year or two ago which tended to damage the American bicycle trade here.

Our manufacturers and other producers will be proud of their reputation on this side. In fact, Scotland and in general lines of war, there are few dealers who do not consent upon the high standard of the articles they receive from the United States. For example, a wholesale grocer, who has handled American tomato catsup, chili sauce, and similar goods for many years, when recently at this consulate to make the necessary declaration for returning a small quantity, about \$100 in value, remarked: "A portion of the last shipment was damaged in some way. This is the first time I have ever sent back any American goods. They have been uniformly first-class. These articles made in the United States are better than the French and are much preferred by the public."
