It is reported that the mining property of Cope Bros. of Galice has been purchased by Colorado capitalists for \$25,000. This property includes about 140 acres of placer ground and several promising quartz ledges.

E. B. Brown has purchased the milk business of R. H. Gillilan, and has also leased the place for a year. Mr. Gillilan and family will remove to town and will occupy Mr. T. F. Croxton's house on Second and A streets.

The Henry Klipple mine on Galice creek was purchased last week by F. H. Osgood of Seattle. This mine embraces 640 acres and contains both placer mines and quartz ledges. Galice creek is a tributary of Rogue river, coming in from the south side below Go d Hill.

Considerable activity is manifest in the mining camp of Galice, and experts have been visiting that locality frequently of late, examining the various quartz mines. Galice has a number of excellent quartz propositions, which only need development to make good paying mines.

W. S. Woods is rushing the building of his new brick hotel and a small army of men are at work there. The foundation is about completed and in a short time there will be a handsome two story brick building on the site of the old Palace Hotel. The brick is being delivered at a rapid rate. This building will be constructed of pressed brick which will make a very handsome wall.

The city council, at the regular meeting on Thursday evening of this week, will act upon an ordinance providing for Monday for the sewer system, which has been provided for. If the ordinance is passed, the council will then advertise for bids for the construction of the whole system. The first ordinance provides that the work shall be completed within three months from the time of letting the contract, and that there shall be a penalty of \$5 per day charged against the contractor for all time consumed over contract limit.
