The town council of Lakeview has purchased the electric light plant of James Anthony at a cost of \$2500, and will add to it about \$7400 more in the way of additions and improvements, and will hereafter conduct the municipal lighting. It will also construct a water system and expects to have that in operation by spring.

A large crowd assembled at the depot on Tuesday evening to see and hear Col. W. J. Bryan, the great man from Nebraska. It had been announced that he would speak for a few minutes from the rear platform of the train. When the train stopped Bryan was there and made use of every minute of the time till it started. He spoke for about ten minutes. Bryan is a man of very pleasant appearance, voice and manner of delivery. He attacked the gold standard, trusts, imperialism and the republican party. He said that in 1896 this country was one of the best in the whole country but did not say its condition had become worse since that time. He said that the republicans ought to send themselves or their sons to be killed by the Filipinos, but owing to the brief time allowed him, did not have time to fully explain himself, and so left many of us in a haze regarding the point he meant to convey. His remarks were listened to in dead silence without any demonstrations. He was cheered by a portion of the crowd as the train left. The band was out in full force and enlivened the performance.
