### Mooney Road Opened.

Last Saturday the county court made official examination of the new Mooney mountain wagon road and decided to accept it after some unimportant improvements requiring only a few days' work. This road provides the people of upper Doer creek with a much more convenient means of communication with Grants Pass than formerly, as it cuts off a number of miles of the distance. The road was built under contract by Geo. P. Furman and George Hartman.

Changes in Train Schedule. On April 16th, some changes will go into effect in the present train schedule. The only trains appreciably affected are the two day passenger trains. The south bound train, No. 15, which now arrives at 9:30 a. m. will arrive at 10:05 and leave at 10:13 a. m. The north bound train, No. 16, due now at 6:45 p. m., will arrive at 6:05 and leave at 6:15 p. m.
