Found Dead.
The body of C. W. Corson, who has been following his trade as painter here for several years past, was found on Tuesday afternoon in what is known as Alder gulch in the Dry Diggins on Tuesday afternoon. He had evidently been dead nearly a week. H. J. Bacher, his partner in the painting business, says that he left here on Tuesday evening last week for the Dry Diggins, where he had a camp and some provisions. His failure to return caused some uneasiness, but it was supposed that he was working on a prospect which he had there. On Tuesday of this week, as he had not yet returned, Mr. Bacher sent a man to look for him, and his body was found. Appearances indicated that he had taken only about one meal at the camp.
The coroner visited the place Wednesday morning, and it was decided that his death was due to heart failure. The position of the body indicated that he had sat down on a low bank, letting his pick fall to the ground, and had fallen over sideways. His watch and about \$10 in money were found on his person. A lot was purchased in the Granite Hill cemetery and the body was buried Wednesday afternoon.

He had been drinking heavily lately, though never intoxicated, and he was also an incessant and excessive smoker of cigars. It is thought that his death is due in a great measure to this excessive use of liquor and tobacco. He was a very quiet and orderly, though sociable and pleasant man, and was well-liked by all his acquaintances.
