Spanish War Buttons
When Manila was captured, the Sea and Oregon was the only regiment to enter the city and receive the surrender of the Spanish army and arms. A number of fine old bronze cannon were captured at that time. One of them was brought home and this splendid old bronze, cast in Spain more than a century ago, is now being made into souvenir buttons by a committee of the volunteers, and the buttons are being sold for the benefit of the fund to erect a handsome and artistic monument to the memory of the soldiers of Oregon who lost their lives in the Spanish and Filipino war. The button is made with a button back for men and boys and a pin back for ladies and girls. The genuineness of the buttons is attested by the certificate of Brigadier-General O. Summers. This is a valuable souvenir of the war, such as every adult child in Oregon would be pleased to possess, especially as the entire proceeds of the sale will go to erect a splendid monument to serve as a perpetual object lesson in patriotism to the youth of the state. Municipal News

The first regular meeting of the new council was held last Thursday evening at the city hall, Mayor Kinney in the chair. At roll call there were present Councilmen Smith, Kuykendall, Dunbar, Renkopf and Fetsch. Hood, McGrew and Haskins arrived soon after, making a full attendance. The oath was administered to Councilman elect Haskins, who was absent on Tuesday evening, and he was seated with the council.

The chair appointed the following committees:
Ways and means, Smith, Renkopf, Kuykendall; expense and accounts, Dunbar, Kuykendall, Fetsch; fire and water, Fetsch, Hood, Smith; city improvement, Hood, McGrew, Dunbar; health, Renkopf, Haskins, Hood; elections, Haskins, Smith, McGrew; judiciary, Kuykendall, Dunbar, Fetsch.

The following bills were allowed: B. O. McCulloch, surveying and establishing grades, \$8; Rogue River Coaches, printing \$4.75; J. W. Barker, auditor and clerk, election expenses, \$25. A report from R. O. McCulloch on a survey establishing the grade of the sidewalk on H. street was referred to the committee on city improvement.

An ordinance, providing for a change in the sewer plans, to run straight through on Fifth street to the alley in block 14, instead of running some distance on Sixth street as originally intended, was read the required number of times and was unanimously passed. An ordinance to close the alley in block 29 of the Railroad addition was read the third time and passed by the council.

The council then proceeded to elect a chairman. After two ballots had been taken, in each of which Dunbar received four votes, Tom Smith moved that he, Dunbar, should be declared the unanimous choice of the council, which was done.

The auditor's bonds were read and accepted. Sureties, B. McArthur and W. E. Dean. The matter of employing a superintendent of sewer construction and also of providing flush tanks for the sewer was brought before the council and it was decided that all matters pertaining to the sewer should be referred to the committee on city improvement.

The mayor stated that he would postpone the appointment of city officers until the next regular meeting and that the present officers should hold over until such appointment was made. Council adjourned until Thursday evening June 7.
