She will be kept on the run for a month in order to determine the comparative cost of wood and coal. It took 4 1/2 tons of coal to run from Portland here while the average engine will consume about 7 cords of wood.—Roseburg Review.
 Work on the High Line Ditch, in Southern Oregon, which when completed will be 94 miles long, will begin in September. The ditch will tap upper Rogue River Rapids, terminating at Gold Hill. There will be 11,000 feet of flume, needing 1,500,000 feet of lumber. The ditch will be six feet deep, eight feet across at the bottom. The grade is 28c per mile, allowing a current of 3.96 per second, and the capacity will be 15,455 cubic feet per minute.
