Fatal Accident.
Harry W. Braad, a brakeman on Conductor Gregory's through freight train, fell under the wheels of a moving car on Saturday at this place and died from his injuries within a few hours. The accident happened a little after noon and just in front of the west end of the depot. He was attempting to climb on a moving car by the end ladder and missed his hold at the top, falling between the rails. As he fell, he attempted to throw himself out of harm's way, only partially succeeding. His right leg and arm were caught beneath the wheels and badly crushed and mangled.
He received prompt attention and a special train consisting of an engine and a caboose was made ready as soon as possible to take him to the hospital at Portland. He was very cheerful and the nerve he displayed was a matter of comment. Many who saw him at the time of leaving, however, expressed a doubt of his surviving the journey. Dr. Kremer accompanied him, but he sank rapidly as the train neared Roseburg and he died near Green's station, about five miles from Roseburg. Philatiner lodge I. O. O. F., of which he was a member, conducted the funeral services on Monday.
He was 23 years of age and his home was at Roseburg, where he was formerly employed in the post office. He was a faithful and efficient employe and very popular among his associates.
