

FEEDING AN ARMY.

An Enormous Task That Involves Much Labor.

Great Quantities of Supplies Constantly in Demand and an Army of Men and Horses to Handle Them.

It is very probable that 30 people out of every 100 think of an army as a great aggregation of fighting men, armed to the teeth with rifles, swords and what not, while they never once give a thought to the "men in the rear."

When an army is encamped in a friendly country there is not so much a difficulty in feeding it as when it is penetrating hostile territory and has separated itself from its own country.

It is no light task to furnish and distribute the food that is to keep, say, 20,000 stomachs satisfied, and 30,000 horses in the right place. This is the work of the commissary department.

When an army division or an army corps is encamped at home, the problem of getting supplies is comparatively simple. Sometimes they are furnished on contract, sometimes bought in large quantities.

Each company of a regiment has its cooks; each regiment has its commissary depot, where supplies are kept sufficient for, say, a week or ten days for all the units.

When the troops are in barracks the work of the kitchen can be better attended to than in the field. Banged and all necessary utensils are on hand and hot meals are served to the different mess tables with regularity.

Whenever any important move is to be made by the army each soldier is usually supplied with rations for a day, which he carries in his haversack.

There are always a number of men detailed from each regiment to assist in the work of bringing up supplies. The keeping open of a line of communication with the base of supplies is the first thing that a commander must see to, for it means the safety of his army.

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SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY.

An illustration of the new lights which release throws upon old questions is the modern expansion of an experiment made nearly three centuries ago by the Flemish scholar, Van Helmont.

Van Helmont, in a pot of earth weighing 2.0 pounds, he planted a willow branch weighing five pounds. He kept the plant well watered, and in five years the willow had gained 164 pounds in weight, while the earth in the pot had lost only two ounces.

Van Helmont inferred that the plant's gain was due only to the water which had been supplied. Modern botanical science tells us that the gain was in great measure due to carbon absorbed from the air.

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BUTTERINE MAKERS.

Use Up All the Grease from Stock-yards and Packing Houses.

Interesting Particulars of the Business in Porkopolis—The Fight in Congress Over Oligopolization.

The following letter, which has been received by Representative Lawney from an employee of the Chicago stock yards, explains itself, says the Washington Journal.

The last 12 years the Chicago production of oligopolization, butterine and what not has steadily increased, while the by-product of packing houses has steadily decreased.

In fact, your kind idea of grease products were procurable for manufacturing purposes.

"Lubricating" fats, inferior fats for soap manufacturing and low grade grease in all quantities on the market for any purpose desirable as well as for export, but lately this has all been changed, and the demand for so-called inferior fats and oil can be turned into products which go into the manufacture of margarine and butterine.

These factories are in no way connected with the stock yards; they are always in the hands of private individuals who are making a good thing of doing business as follows:

"The melted fat and beef lard is saved carefully, then transferred in nicely pointed wagons to a system of pipes in the city. This part of the process is all right, but how about the thousands of barrels of oleo oil that leave the stock yards in nice iron-bound, varnished kegs, many people think it is for export. Not so; these kegs are filled with anything that can be squeezed out and delivered to the factories. When these barrels are emptied they are returned to the stock yards, where they are filled again. This is the principal ingredient in the margarine and butterine which go into the manufacture of margarine and butterine.
