The ice industry in Grants Pass is assuming large proportions under the management of the Water, Light and Power company. They have been shipping ice in small quantities for some time and to many points. On Monday, they sent a carload to Portland. The company expects to ship fully a car load of ice each week to different points during the hot season, and this output, in addition to their large local trade, will tax the capacity of their plant. Their new storage room is almost completed and will be ready for use in a day or two. The ice made here is of the very best quality, firm and solid, made from distilled water. The machinery is of the latest and most approved pattern and both plant and product are first class in every respect.
