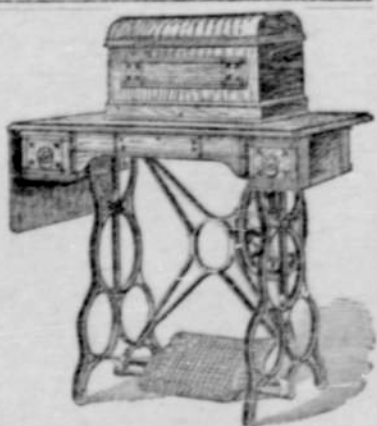

Back to Public Domain.

A decree restoring about 100 sections of land in Lake and Klamath counties to the Government was rendered by Judge Bellinger in the United States Court at Portland, Saturday in the suit of the United States against the Oregon Central Military Road Company. The decree was granted upon the motion of United States District Attorney John H. Hall. The suit was brought to recover the lands on the ground that the defendant has not conformed to the terms of the grant.

The decree states that the patents issued by the United States purporting to convey title to these lands be and are hereby set aside, cancelled and declared null and void, and the title reverted to the United States, and all deeds of the Oregon Central Military Road Company to the California & Oregon Land Company, to the lot for these lands, are declared to be set aside and cancelled.

Archbishop Christie's Visit.

Christie is spoken of in the highest terms by all who have had the pleasure of an introduction to him, and his coming visit announced last Sunday by Father Hickey, pastor of the Catholic church, is looked forward to by the citizens of Grants Pass with the keenest interest. Father Hickey says that the Archbishop will preach at High Mass Sunday Sept. 2, then administer Confirmation, and most likely deliver a formal lecture in the evening. His Grace, the Rev. Father said, was a most polished and forcible speaker to hear whom will be a treat seldom enjoyed by any audience.

Father Hickey is laboring hard by morning and evenings instruction to bring up his confirmation class of children and adults to the highest point of catechetical efficiency, and hope for the most gratifying results. All the Confirmation candidates from the outside missions are expected to be in Grants Pass from Sunday 26th day of Aug. until Sunday Sept. 2 for a full week's final training. Fuller details of the religious celebration will be given in next issue. His Grace will be here Sunday Sept. 2. High Mass will commence at 10 o'clock a. m. and there will be no admission charges. Owing however to the limited accommodations of the church, and to avoid a crush or other inconvenience, entrance can only be had by tickets procurable from the pastor the week previous to the celebration.

Road to Copper Stain.
E. W. Dana was in last week from the Copper Stain mine on Mt. Reuben. He has advertised for bids for the construction of four miles of road, from Reuben creek to the Copper Stain mine. The survey shows an unexpected feasibility of the route, as there will not necessarily be more than a 10 per cent grade for any portion of the distance. As the company is building this road wholly at their own expense, it is proposed that the county should make some expenditure in improving the road from Leland to Reuben creek. From the Copper Stain, it would be easy to connect with the Gold Bug and the whole Mt. Reuben district, which will in all probability be one of the foremost quartz milling districts in Southern Oregon.

Gold Wedge Bonded.

This was formerly known as the Hutchins-Kramer mine and is one of the valuable quartz properties of the Galice district.
