

ONE MILLION A DAY.

Value of Imports of Tropical Products Into United States.

Most of the Articles Are Produced in Greater or Less Degree in the New Island Possessions.

The people of the United States are paying \$1,000,000 a day for tropical products used in manufacturing or food and drink, and most of which are produced in greater or less degree or can be readily produced in the islands which have come into closer relations with the United States through the events of the past two years.

India rubber, fibers, raw silk, cotton, gums, cabinet woods, indigo, ivory, dyer's woods and certain lines of chemicals make up the share of this vast sum which the manufacturers of the United States take and require in constantly increasing quantities.

Of the constantly increasing proportion of imports of raw materials, of course, in first, and of that proportion which comes from the tropics is vastly greater in the past year than in immediately preceding years.

TICKED FIVE CENTURIES.

The Famous Old Town Clock in Rouen Has Kept Time for 510 Years.

Rouen, one of the principal cities of France, and the greatest seat of its cotton manufacture, possesses the oldest public clock in the world. The great Rouen clock has held its place in that city for 510 years and is the pride of its citizens. It was in 1380, it has been running without interruption from that day to this, requiring nothing except cleaning and a few trifling repairs of its necessary parts. The great clock had so accustomed the citizens to look upon its exactitude as a matter of course that when, in 1875, the breaking of a wire prevented its sounding five o'clock one morning, the population was in a state of consternation.

The magistrates summoned the custodian—Guillaume Petit—and remonstrated gravely with him. Until 1719 the great clock had no pendulum. For 333 years it had no other regulator than a "foliot," an apparatus unknown to the majority of modern clockmakers. The pendulum in clockwork was introduced in 1659, but so well satisfied were the people of Rouen with the time-keeping quality of their famous old clock that 12 years were allowed to pass before a pendulum was substituted for the "foliot." Equipped with this new apparatus it has continued to this day to strike the hours and chime the quarters.

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MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

There are nearly 2,000 athletes in a pair of hand-saw boots.

Nearly half a million people bathe every year in Utah's Salt Lake. Bermuda has furnished New York florists with lily bulbs for many years. Twelve canals shipped from Algiers to New York died on the voyage across the Atlantic.

The imports of crude rubber to this country have in the last 20 years increased 43 per cent. Some one has calculated that the postman in London walks, together, something like 48,360 miles a day—a distance equal to twice the circumference of the globe.

In the last 60 years the speed of ocean steamers has been increased from 10 to 25 knots an hour. Lengths have been more than tripled in length, about doubled in breadth and increased tenfold in displacement. The number of passengers carried by a steamship has been increased from 100 to nearly 2,500. The engine power has been made 40 times as great, while the rate of coal consumption per horse power is now only about one-third what it was in 1840.

The shape of the fan was originally modeled after the palm leaf, but it now appears under many different forms. The fixed fan, which is the most primitive type, was first constructed from a leaf on a stalk. The "Lamella" and folding fans were probably introduced in the fifteenth century.
