Wilson & Roper Burlarized.
On Friday night the jewelry and tobacco store of Wilson & Roper was burglarized and over \$100 in value was taken, principally in the cheaper grade of jewelry, the more valuable jewelry being locked up in the safe. A number of tobacco pipes were taken and a comparatively small amount of cash, the contents of the till and the nickel in the slot machine which was broken open and rifled. The building was entered apparently by breaking the glass in the rear door so that the hand could be inserted and the door unlocked from the inside. Some blood was smeared on the door as though the burglar had cut his hand on the glass.
On Saturday afternoon Marshal Bell arrested B. D. Cosino, who has been with Wilson & Roper as jeweler and watchmaker since they assumed control of the establishment. At about half past one on the night of the robbery, Bell saw a man in the store whom he is certain was Cosino, but knowing that Cosino was connected with the establishment, supposed it was all right. Cosino, on the other hand, positively denies being in or near the place at that time. He promptly furnished bonds and is now awaiting his preliminary trial which has been postponed from day to day awaiting the advent of the district attorney and is set for Friday. The prevailing belief favors Cosino's innocence, especially as no apparent reason appears for such an act on his part.
