The audience which greeted "The
Girl I Left Behind Me" at the opera
house last Saturday evening was more
large, but those who attended were more
pleased with the manner of presenta-

Death of Wm. Griffin.
Wm. Griffin, an old and respected
resident of this country, died on Satur-
day at his home on Rogue river about
10 miles below Grants Pass, under
peculiarly distressing circumstances.
Mr. Griffin was suffering both from ill-
ness and from a hurt received some days
previously and was in a very serious
condition physically. On Saturday, the
house caught fire and was burned to the
ground, hardly anything being saved.
Mr. Griffin was rescued from the burning
building but the excitement and suffoca-
tion were more than he could sur-
vive in his weak condition and he
died in a few minutes after being re-
moved. The remains was taken to Medford
on Monday.
