Pope Leo is reported to have made a will in which he designates his successor. The pope is usually chosen by conclave, but the right of Leo to name his successor is not questioned.

Reports from China being tales of scandals - cruelty on the part of the European troops toward the natives and say that their outrages relieve those of the Bixers. While it is not probable that many of these reports are wholly without foundation, it is nevertheless likely that some of them are true and the civilized world is alarmed thereby. It is a matter which should command the attention of the nations and each one should see that such stringent military government is enforced that would make outrages something to be avoided.

One of the largest fires of modern years occurred in Jacksonville, Florida, on May 3. The fire seemed trivial at the start, but a strong wind fanned the flames and they became unmanageable. The burned district is 23 blocks wide and two miles long and comprises 118 blocks of the city. Ten thousand people are left homeless and the property loss is in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000. There was little loss of life, but 300 persons are reported to have been rescued. Secretary Rice promptly tendered the use of the army barracks near St. Augustine for the use of the homeless. Relief subscriptions are being received in many places throughout the United States.

President McKinley spent Sunday in El Paso, Texas. It had been planned that President Diaz of Mexico should meet him here to shake hands with him across the line, but coming to the fact that the Mexican congress is in session, it was impossible for the latter president to leave his capital, so that he was obliged to send his greetings by proxy in the person of Don Juan Hernandez, who, also, it may be supposed, was empowered to transact the hand Diaz sent hearty greetings to the president of the United States "as cordial a salute as corresponds with the cordial relations which exist between the two republics of North America."

Complaint is again made of the nuisance of boys jumping on trains in motion and riding on freight cars up and down the yards. This nuisance is one that is common to all towns that have both boys and railroad and such irresponsible youths are one of the vexations of the age. The practice is harmful in many ways; it is full of danger to life and limb of the offenders, it is annoying in the extreme to the railroad employes, and, worse than all, it is a potent educator. When a boy gets so far advanced that he is able to successfully stand rides on a train, he is directly in line toward becoming a full fledged hobo if he has in any degree a leaning in that direction. It may not be possible to completely eradicate this nuisance but it should be eradicated in so far as sentiment and officers are able to do it. Any degree of mitigation of the evil is worth the effort. The danger to the boys movable and future work is greater than that to his neck or skin.

Contrary to prophecy, Monday evening was not so suspicious for hilarity as has been noted other occasions of like character. Undoubtedly many were "laid out" during the progress of the night, but there was no disorder worth mentioning and little to proclaim to a stranger that it was election night. The practice of getting drunk on election night is disgraceful and far too universal. Too many, after discussing questions of government, immediately proceed to misgoverning themselves. When a person thinks cold bloodedly on the subject, it appears truly marvelous that being especially reasonable and intelligent, should knowingly place themselves in an imbecile condition. A man's mind is one of his most precious possessions and good sense is at premium always. No person has too much of it and many suffer from a paucity of the article. No man has so great a pleatade of good sense that he can afford to be without whatever portion nature has given him for a day or two at a time. It is a thing that he needs every minute of his life and he needs it just as much on election night as at any other time. The scarcity of wine, hilarity and hysterical disorder on Monday evening was a deplorable circumstance.
